First things first - in order to use


Google Drive you must have a Google Account. (note: if you have a Gmail email address then you have a Google Account. If you don't, you can sign up for one for free.) A Google Account gives you access to a variety of Google Apps such as Gmail, Calendar and Drive. Google Drive contains cloud storage that Google gives you for free. It also encompasses the Google Docs application for writing letters, Google Slides for making presentations and Google Sheets for making spreadsheets. Follow the steps below to get started!

- Go to google.com and sign in to your Google Account by clicking Sign In from the upper right corner of your screen.
- 2. Enter your username, click Next, enter your password, Click Sign In.

Tech On-The-Go

This past October I sat myself down and decided that it was time to put some sort of budget in place for myself. Not because I spend foolishly, mind you (though the definition of "foolish" might waver to suit my needs at times), but because I like to keep track of where my money goes these days. Ah, to be young and to purchase a tankful of gas, a purple duster, and two tickets to see Prince in concert without adding up the cost...

Perhaps you like to hold onto your receipts like I do but have found that they just wind up stuffed in a drawer until you can go through them and entered into your budget spreadsheet. This is where some clever apps can help. Both apps below can be found for Apple and Android devices and are free to use.



Receipts By Wave is a great little app that looks like a simple piece of software that keeps track of your receipts, but log in to Wave on your computer and you can track your spending and accounting. Personally, I just

really like the way that I can take a photo of my receipt and the app reads it and (most times) adds all the info on an easy to read screen. Too, I can find all of my receipts in one place and not have to worry about accidentally throwing one out or losing one around my house. While the simple scanning feature floats my boat, some of you power users might get a kick out of all it can do. Registration is required but the app is free to use.



The second app that we'll look at is called IQBoxy. This app is only for Apple devices for now though they promise that it will be available for Android users soon. IQBoxy is a lot like Receipts By Wave except it also has the added feature of adding a mileage

calculator for those of you who drive from place to place for business and keep track of your mileage for tax purposes. Very handy!

You can check out other apps available to you by checking Google Play (Android) and the App Store (Apple) and searching for "receipts" or "receipt tracker". Be sure you check any app that you find out further by visiting the maker's website since some apps cost money to use them each month, but again, the two we've listed here

Repair Secrets

All of our portable electronic devices have power cords, but

did you know that there's a right way and a wrong way to wrap the cord up for storage when you aren't using it? If you wrap the cord tightly



around the power brick or twist the cord tightly around itself you're asking for trouble. I'm guilty of tightly twisting my laptop cord around the power brick before shoving it into my

laptop bag but saw the error of my ways when I realized that the cord was fraying where it connected to the power brick from the tight pull on the cord itself. Frayed cords and electricity do not go well together as you can imagine so let's talk about how to avoid frayed cords and the expense of having to replace them.

Most Windows based laptops these days have a large square "brick" that is part of the power cord and when packing our computer up to take it

with us it's easy to just wrap the cord around the brick. Instead of doing that, take a moment and disconnect (if your power cord comes in two pieces) the two pieces that make up the length of the power cord



and wrap them separately like the picture to the right.



Power cords for Apple products can be a bit tricky because the cords are very thin, so the one basic rule here is that whenever you wrap up the cord put a loop at the end where thin cord comes out of the

small power brick like in this picture.

The same goes for carrying the charger for your phone: WRAP LOOSELY. And remember, twisty ties are great in a pinch but look into getting Velcro ties as they last a lot longer and are great for lots of things, not just keeping your cables sorted properly. Amazon.com carries them and you can get a pack of 50 for under \$6. members of the group. Click <u>here</u> for our schedule.
