Computer Technology Club



The Book Club

D ooks for April:

- * Assassins of the Turquoise Palace Roya Hakakian
- * The World America Made Robert Hagan

John Weingarten led off the March meeting with a discussion of Hidden American (Jeanne Laskas). In this book are stories about the people who make our lives run every day - and yet we barely think about them. Among these workers are miners, air traffic controllers, migrant workers, oil rig workers in Alaska, land fill employees, even cheerleaders for the Cincinnati Bengals. Many revelatory facts emerge. For example, many of the coal miners in Cadiz, Ohio are also farmers, who only work in the mines to finance their farms. We also learn that Maine is the largest producer of wild blueberries in the world. Washington County is where most of this work is one. Harvesting blueberries is backbreaking work, and, although one can earn as much as \$1350 a week, migrant workers do this job because the locals don't want to, even though the unemployment rate in this area is 12.2 percent......

Tom Fitzpatrick gave a concise review of Ike's Bluff (Evan Thomas), which provides insight into Eisenhower's personality, character and abilities. Also discussed the major events of his Presidency. We learned that Ike hated and feared the idea of war in the Nuclear Age, and yet fostered the impression among the Soviets that if war came he would go all out, including nuclear weapons, as opposed to fighting a conventional war. This was "Ike's Bluff." It was his strategy to keep the peace. The book discusses the Suez Crisis, the U-2 spy plane incident, and this use of the CIA in Iran and Guatemala. Ike was wary of requests from the military for what he considered unnecessary or excessive funding, which led to his coining the phrase "Military-Industrial Complex." Everyone agreed that after reading this book, you came away with a much more favorable impression of Eisenhower and his Presidency.......

Can a cat really predict when a person is about to die? That is one of the questions raised in Making the Rounds with Oscar (David Dosa), a book **Joe Infosino** introduced. The cat, Oscar, one of several in the nursing home, is permitted to roam about Steere House, a nursing home in Providence, RI, and for whatever reason, does sense when a patient is about to die, and jumps on that person's bed, snuggles up to that patient, and stays there until that person passes away, usually within hours. This is a true story written by Dr David Dosa, a geriatrics specialist, many of who's patients reside at this nursing ome. Most of them suffer from a form of dementia, usually Alzheimer's, and most of the book discusses the effect of the disease on the patient, the family, and the compassionate nursing home staff that serves them. Informative and inspirational.
