# **Proposed Amendment to AU By-Laws**

The Executive Board has approved the following amendment to the By Laws of Activities Unlimited to be submitted to the membership for a vote. The amended wording is underscored below.

By-Laws, Article VIII, Section 5.

Any member in good standing as of December 31, 2015 and who attains the age of 90 by January 1 of the membership year is no longer required to pay annual dues. Members joining after December 31, 2015 and reaching the age of 90 or more will continue to pay the then established annual dues.

#### Background:

AU is fortunate that an ever increasing number of our members remain active in their nineties and beyond. We can estimate that, in the future, continuing to exempt a larger number of such members from paying annual dues would adversely affect the revenue needed to support AU activities. In such case, an increased amount of annual dues would be required of all other members. The policy of exempting members 90 and older from annual dues will continue for all members in good standing as of December 31, 2015. It is anticipated that a membership vote on the amendment will be taken at the April General Membership meeting, which follows publishing the proposed amendment in two issues of the AU Newsletter.

## ooks for April:

MAYFLOWER (Nathaniel Philbrick) recommended by **Jerry Hulit** tells, in a very detailed way, the story of the Pilgrims who landed in Plymouth MA in 1620, their harrowing passage across the Atlantic, and what really happened between the Pilgrims and the Native Americans. Both sides benefited from great leadership but after 50 years of relative peace a fierce war broke out between the two sides leading to the near-destruction of the Native American population.

ROAD ENDS (Mary Lawson) a novel recommended by **Joe Infosino** relates the story of a dysfunctional family in northern Ontario, Canada, in the late 1960's. As the story progresses the main characters start to develop some insight into their self destructive behavior and the reader holds out hope they will eventually reverse the downward spiral of their lives. Interesting and well written.

GHETTOSIDE (Jill Leovy) recommended by **Joe Clinton** describes the crisis of black on black homicide in South Central Los Angeles. It's told through the story of African-American Bryant Tennelle, the 18 year old son of a homicide detective, who is murdered in a drive-by shooting. The case is eventually solved, but with great difficulty, as it is nearly impossible to get witnesses to testify. The author provides insight into the socio-economic problems that lead to such a high murder rate, for example, 1/3 of state prisoners have mental problems. Some of the initiatives being taken to reduce crime are also described. Well researched and well written.

#### **Public Discussion Group**

At the March 18, 2016 meeting the group enjoyed another informative and friendly discussion at its March meeting. The topics were timely and dealt with whether the Constitution was a "living document" and what were the reasons for gridlock in Washington. The group had a number of different views with some favoring the "originalist" approach of the late Justice Scalia and others favoring a more interpretative approach. There was general agreement that some flexibility was needed because times had changed so dramatically since 1789.

Similarly, with respect to gridlock, the group shared many different opinions. Some thought that the divide between extreme left and extreme right made compromise impossible; others pointed to the fact that elected officials spent too little time in Washington, didn't move families there and didn't interact at a social level with colleagues because of the need to raise campaign money.

This, in turn, led to a discussion of term limits. There was a general consensus that little would change unless more Americans got out and voted.

# **TD Bank Agreement**

We are pleased to inform you we have completed the arrangements with TD Bank that makes Activities Unlimited a member in the TD Affinity program. The AU member number is AH005. (That is letters A and H followed by the number zero-zero-five) The name on the account is Wyckoff Reformed Church--Activities Unlimited.

For anyone who opens a new TD checking account AU will be credited with \$50 after one year of the account being open. # **The History Club**

#### The next History Club meeting is April 25, 1 PM—-Hiroshima and Nagasaki Revisited.

7 1 years ago, after the bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, the debate among historians and scholars alike surrounding the event, concerns the legal, ethical and military controversies. The fundamental question that has divided the scholars over period of 7 decades is whether the use of the atomic bomb was necessary to achieve victory in the war in the Pacific on terms satisfactory to the United States. Supporters of the bombing believed it caused Japanese surrender, preventing massive casualties on both sides in the planned invasion of Japan. The estimated casualty among the invading allies ranged from 1.7 to 4 million of whom 400,000-800,000 dead, while the Japanese fatalities would have been around 5 to 10 million. Those who opposed bombings cited a number of reasons for their views, among them: a belief that atomic bombing was fundamentally immoral, that the bombings counted as a war crimes, that they were militarily unnecessary, that it constituted State terrorism. So the debates goes on-----and so, what do you think? Let us hear your view by attending this meeting.

In February, "A Little Bit of Middle Ages History" was presented by **Walt Widmer**. The presentation dealt mostly with the history of Europe, starting with the beginning of Christianity, the rise of Constantine the Great to power and the fall of the Roman Empire. In 330 C. E., Constantine the Great moved the capital of the Roman Empire to Byzantium and renamed it Constantinople (now Istanbul, Turkey), in his honor. The Byzantine Empire remained there for over 1000 years and was the strongest, largest and wealthiest city in Europe. Black Death was also mentioned.

History of Slam was briefly mentioned and the conquest of the Byzantine Empire by the Ottoman Turks under Sultan Mehmed II on May 29, 1453. Questions, answers and comments followed the presentation. Great job by Walt.
