# **Note from the President**

This month, just by way of a reminder, I want to use this space to emphasize an important courtesy AU owes our sponsor, WRC. As you know, the church operates a nursery school and is subject to very stringent regulations about access to the premises when school is in session. Occasionally, we members overlook this fact, which could put WRC in jeopardy of losing its accreditation. The basic rule is no AU member should use the Haneveld Hall entrance door (downstairs from the parking lot) between 9:00 am and 12:30 pm on any General Meeting day. During these hours, the door should never be propped open for any reason and should not be opened to let someone enter. On our meeting days, please follow these guidelines.

Band members arriving **before 11:15** am should bring their instruments only through the Nursery School entrance at the back (ground level) where a nursery school employee will open the door. There is no entry through the doors downstairs and off the parking lot. All other members are to enter via the front doors facing Wyckoff Avenue.

Between 11:15 am - 12:30 pm entry is only through the front double doors where members will be buzzed in by a school employee.

The entrance doors at the foot of the stairs off the parking lot are to be used for entry on General Meeting days only between 12:30 pm – 1:15 pm during which time this door is unlocked. Anyone coming for the meeting before or after these times must enter through the front double doors.

WRC is very generous to AU in acting as sponsor and providing meeting space for both the monthly meeting and various club activities. Let's make sure we support this relationship by adhering to the state-mandated access rules. Thank you.

#### The Book Club

At the March Book Club meeting 3 books were reviewed and discussed.

The Worst Hard Time, by Timothy Egan, was summarized by Jerry Hulit. It is the story of the Dust Bowl, the extremely difficult times experienced by farmers and settlers in the southern Great Plains during the 1930's brought on by drought and dust storms. Converting millions of acres that for perhaps hundreds of years was covered by grass and fed millions of American bison and cattle, these settlers unwittingly plowed up the ground and planted wheat and other crops that after harvesting in the fall left the lands barren, susceptible to erosion, and ultimately huge dust storms. Coupled with huge variations in wheat prices over the years because of supply and demand, it is a tale of a daunting existence as the author not only describes the enormity of such storms, sometimes drifting across the eastern U. S., but the human toll experienced in case histories. There was some added insightful input in the following discussion by some of the attendees who had geological and agricultural experiences.

Ruthless, by Ron Miscavige, was covered by **Lee Warner**. Miscavige was a follower of the Church of Scientology and supporter of its founder Ron Hubbard but in this book claims that now under the leadership of his son, David Miscavige, it is all about exacting money and labor from the faithful. He traces his own life and family's involvement with Scientology over the years and his belief that through its philosophy you can will things to happen or not happen. But now, because of David's Machiavellian rise to power, including ostracizing him, he describes it more as a monastic, restrictive society. There seemed to be general agreement that, although it is classified as a religion, it functions more as a cult.

Bellevue: Three centuries of medicine and mayhem at America's most storied hospital, by David M. O'Shinsky, was reviewed by Vince Tortorelli. It traces its origin from a small early Dutch infirmary through its rise, expansion, and standing to today being the place injured New York City cops, firemen, and visiting dignitaries needing emergency treatment ask to be taken. Because it is a city hospital Bellevue was at first a place for the poor, largely immigrants, since the more well to do were treated at home. But the author describes how over the years the institution was not only in the forefront, but actually started a number of groundbreaking medical initiatives, such as the first hospital to use ambulances in emergencies to carry people to the hospital, and founding the country's first nursing school. The book also details Bellevue's service during the various outbreaks of yellow fever, cholera, typhus, influenza and tuberculosis that the city encountered over the years, as well as how it was affected by 9/11 and Hurricane Sandy. During the subsequent discussion a number of club members added interesting personal input experienced by them and/or family members.



Checking out at the store, the young cashier suggested to the much older woman, that she should bring her own grocery bags because plastic bags weren't good for the environment.

The woman apologized and explained, "We didn't have this 'green thing' back in my earlier days."

The young clerk responded, "That's our problem today. Your generation did not care enough to save our environment for future generations."

She was right -- our generation didn't have the 'green thing' in its day.

Back then, we returned milk bottles, soda bottles and beer bottles to the store. The store sent them back to the plant to be washed and sterilized and refilled, so it could use the same bottles over and over. So they really were recycled.

But we didn't have the "green thing" back in our day.

Grocery stores bagged our groceries in brown paper bags, that we reused for numerous things, most memorable besides household garbage bags, was the use of brown paper bags as book covers for our schoolbooks. This was to ensure that public property, (the books provided for our use by the school) was not defaced by our scribbling's. Then we were able to personalize our books on the brown paper bags.

But too bad we didn't do the "green thing" back then.

We walked up stairs, because we didn't have an escalator in every store and office building. We walked to the grocery store and didn't climb into a 300-horsepower machine every time we had to go two blocks.

But she was right. We didn't have the "green thing" in our day.

Back then, we washed the baby's diapers because we didn't have the throwaway kind. We dried clothes on a line, not in an energy-gobbling machine burning up 220 volts -- wind and solar power really did dry our clothes back in our early days. Kids got hand-medown clothes from their brothers or sisters, not always brand-new clothing.

But that young lady is right; we didn't have the "green thing" back in our day.

Back then, we had one TV, or radio, in the house -- not a TV in every room. And the TV had a small screen the size of a handker-chief (remember them?), not a screen the size of the state of Montana. In the kitchen, we blended and stirred by hand because we didn't have electric machines to do everything for us. When we packaged a fragile item to send in the mail, we used wadded up old newspapers to cushion it, not Styrofoam or plastic bubble wrap. Back then, we didn't fire up an engine and burn gasoline just to cut the lawn. We used a push mower that ran on human power. We exercised by working so we didn't need to go to a health club to run on treadmills that operate on electricity.

But she's right; we didn't have the "green thing" back then.

We drank from a fountain when we were thirsty instead of using a cup or a plastic bottle every time we had a drink of water. We refilled writing pens with ink instead of buying a new pen, and we replaced the razor blades in a razor instead of throwing away the whole razor just because the blade got dull.

But we didn't have the "green thing" back then.

Back then, people took the streetcar or a bus and kids rode their bikes to school or walked instead of turning their moms into a 24-hour taxi service in the family's \$45,000 SUV or van, which cost what a whole house did before the "green thing." We had one electrical outlet in a room, not an entire bank of sockets to power a dozen appliances. And we didn't need a computerized gadget to receive a signal beamed from satellites 23,000 miles out in space in order to find the nearest burger joint.

But isn't it sad the current generation laments how wasteful we old folks were just because we didn't have the "green thing" back then?

From a selfish old person who needs a lesson in conservation from a smart a\*\* young person...

We don't like being old in the first place, so it doesn't take much to p?\*\* us off...especially from a tattooed, multiple pierced smart a\*\* who can't make change without the cash register telling them how much.
