## **Public Discussion Group**

The group enjoyed another two hours of lively discussion. The first topic, "Black Lives Matter" took up over an hour because of its topicality. The discussion elicited a variety of views and offered a lot of facts and statistics. Many felt the movement name was inappropriate because all lives matter. Others pointed out that the name was a starting point to address issues of discriminatory policing techniques and a biased criminal justice system. Some pointed to the role of financial support from individuals like George Soros, who reportedly gave \$33 million to the movement. Others noted that the focus should be on "black on black" crime, which was the real threat to inner city communities. In this regard, statistics show that more "whites" are killed in police encounters than "blacks." This suggests that at the fatal shooting level, there is no discernable bias. On the other hand, there is the perception that the "system" is loaded against minorities. Most agreed that there is a problem, although the causes are not so clear. Is there institutional racism as incarceration rates suggest? Do racial attitudes create an implicit racism on the part of the police? Are we witnessing the consequences of slavery and legally imposed racial separation and bias that lasted until relatively recently? All good questions, but without any clear answers. As in previous meetings, everyone seemed to agree that the solution would only come out of economic and educational progress that created equal opportunities for all.

There followed a briefer discussion about "assault weapons" and whether the 2nd Amendment included them in the "right to bear arms." Although defining an assault weapon is vague, most agreed that rapid fire and cartridge type were characteristics. Some argued for a total ban and others for stronger safety regulations and possibly special, limited restrictions on ownership. Nonetheless, there was no unanimity about 2nd Amendment coverage.

The group then turned to "global warming and whether it was real." Some felt that the planet was in the midst of a long weather cycle and it was a natural phenomenon. Others pointed to the science and the fact that certain molecules, for example, carbon and methane, reduce the amount of ultra-violet heat escaping from the atmosphere. Inevitably, planetary temperatures will rise and at some point the trend becomes irreversible. It was an interesting discussion of the science associated with the climate, but probably changed few minds. Nonetheless, everyone learned more about the topic. The next meeting will be on Wednesday, August 10th at Larkin House at 9:30 am. Topics are: "UN Membership" "The Presidential Nominees;" and "What does, "Make America great again" mean?" It'll be a great discussion and all members are invited.

## The History Club

n May 23, **Tom Butler** presented "The Zulu Nation: From Shaka to Cetshwayo and the Anglo-Zulu War of 1879. He talked about the beginning of the Zulu Kingdom and discussed the rise of Shaka, the first Zulu King. Through war and conquest, Shaka built the small Zulu tribe into the Zulu Kingdom. In 1828 he was assassinated by his half brothers through power struggle. In the ensuing years the control for power in the Zulu Kingdom continued which eventually led to Cetshwayo taking over as a ruler in 1872. In the 1870's the British Empire had colonies in Southern Africa bordering on various Boer settlements, native African Kingdoms such as the Zulus and other indigenous tribal states. Various interactions with these groups followed an expansionist policy. All of these different groups are competing for the same resources, land, etc. which eventually led to tension and border disputes. The pretext for the war between the Zulu leader, Cetshwayo and the British was border disputes. While Cetshwayo's army numbered 35,000 men, it was essentially a militia force. It had a very limited logistical capacity and could not stay in the field a few weeks before the troops would be obliged to return to their civilian duties. Zulu warriors were armed primarily with thrusting spears, clubs and shields made of cowhide. The British numbering about 15,000 men, was under the direct command of Lord Chelmsford. The Zulu warriors had initial successes. However, the British prevailed and Cetshwayo's forces were decisively defeated. Following the conclusion of the Anglo-Zulu war, the British government released Cetshwayo from Robben Island and returned him to zululand in 1883.

Q and A followed the presentation. Discussion was educational and informative. Thanks Tom, great job.

- \* WHEN PARIS WENT DARK Ronald Mossbottom
- \* ONCE WE WERE BROTHERS Ronald Balson
- \* WATCHING THE DARK Peter Robinson

BILLION DOLLAR SPY (David Hoffman), presented by Jerry Hulit, is a true story about a highly placed Russian recruited as a spy by the CIA in Moscow. He provided the U.S. with invaluable (hence, the title) top secret info on Soviet aircraft and radar that enabled the US military to counteract the Soviet capability. After 7 years, he was outed by a disgruntled former CIA employee. Fascinating story of how the CIA's Moscow unit operated and foiled the KBG.....IMBECILES: THE SUPREME COURT, AMERICAN EUGENICS, AND THE STERILIZATION OF CARRIE BUCK (Adam Cohen) introduced by **John O'Brien** describes a sad chapter in American history. The theory of eugenics, embraced by many notable Progressives in the early 1900's, such as Theodore Roosevelt, Margaret Sanger and Oliver Wendell Holmes, sought to reduce the number of feebleminded persons in the country by eliminating, by means of sterilization, their ability to propagate. A test case using a poor white girl, her infant daughter and the girl's mother, all considered feebleminded, worked its way up to the Supreme Court where it was upheld 8 to 1. Oliver Wendell Holmes was the Chief Justice. About 70,000 women and girls were eventually sterilized before the country came to its senses and reversed this travesty......TRIED BY WAR ( James McPherson ), submitted by Joe Pullaro tells the story of how Pres. Lincoln, during the Civil War, expanded the role of Commander-in -Chief unlike any president before or since. His oversight of military strategy consumes most of the book. In the first few years of the war most of his generals did not prove up to the task. Mainly, they were hesitant to engage the enemy, and when they had the opportunity failed to press their advantage. This all changed with Gen Grant in charge. He proved to be the competent, aggressive military man Lincoln coveted: attack on multi-fronts simultaneously and destroy the enemy's army. The book also discussed Lincoln's evolving attitude toward slavery and his Emancipation Proclamation. Well written and well re-

ee Warner led the discussion of WHEN PARIS WENT DARK (Ronald Rossbottom) an account of the German occupation of Paris during WW2. The author describes the weak military defense put up by the French, the somewhat meek acceptance of the German occupation, widespread fraternization, Nazi persecution of the Jews (often abetted by the French citizens and police), lack of a coordinated Resistance until after the Russians were victorious over the Germans on the Eastern Front, and the peaceful departure of the Germans, contrary to Hitler's order to raze the city. Lots of interesting facts. Well written......ONCE WE WERE BROTHERS (Ronald Balson) an historical novel summarized by Joe Clinton, starts off with Ben Solomon, a holocaust survivor, publicly accusing Chicagoan Elliot Rosenzweig, a wealthy philanthropist, of really being Otto Piatek, a Nazi war criminal. The book is part legal thriller, part action/love story, and part history book. It is fast paced, does an excellent job of describing life in Nazi occupied Poland, but could have spent more time in character development........Vince Tortorelli reviewed WATCHING THE DARK (Peter Robinson) a crime novel featuring Inspector Alan Banks, a recurring character in his novels. The story begins with the cross-bow killing of Bill Quinn, a police detective. A search of his room turns up some compromising photos, suggesting an extra-marital affair before his wife died, and possible blackmail. Quinn's major unsolved case was the disappearance of a young girl six years earlier in Estonia. The author does a good job of pulling together different story lines (murder, a missing girl, human trafficking) into a cohesive entertaining story. The action moves from Eastvale, England, to Estonia and its police and underworld. All who read the book give it a thumbs up.

I recently completed 2 books (recommended for Summer Reading), and picked up several Science Great Course Book/ DVDs from Bob Saletta's home (see below).

September 20, 2016 (Tuesday, 10 AM)--Gene Ingrassia will give a talk on his experience in the Fire Prevention field. It is an important area in industrial applications, as well as in our homes.

Additionally, we are contacting Lamont Labs to determine if we will be able to attend their Open House on Saturday, October 8.

October 18, 2016 (Tuesday, 10 AM)--Harry Bennett will speak on Packaging Engineering. He has been teaching Packaging Engineering at Rutgers, since he retired from Estée Lauder.

November (date to be determined)--Museum of Natural History, NY Car Pool trip- Visit the new exhibit on Dinosaurs, featuring the Titanosaur, the fossils of which were found in the Patagonian Desert in Argentina in 2014.

Books.- Seven Brief Lessons on Physics, Carlo Rovelli, theoretical physicist Aix Marseille University (Riverhead Books, 2016). These lessons trace the revolution in physics in the twentieth and twenty-first centuries from Einstein through Quantum Mechanics and Black Holes. It was originally presented from a Sunday Supplement to an Italian newspaper, and is very readable.

The Big Picture, Sean Carroll, PhD, Cal Tech (Dutton, 2016). This more difficult book covers just about everything in modern science (physics, chemistry, biology, genetics). He stresses the use of Bayesian statistics to evaluate various scientific theories. Some chapters are excellent, some not so much. Enjoy.

Great Courses-- Thanks to Geraldine Saletta for offerering Bob's material. The material we took has been placed in the AU cabinet, in the Main Hall, and is available for anyone for review or who might like to consider a presentation. There are many books/DVDs on Space, Astronomy etc. (which we did not take). We took the Following: Cosmology (Parts 1, 2, and 3); Particle Physics (for non-physicists--3 parts); Quantum Mechanics (Parts 1, 2, and 3).
