Public Discussion Group

Public Discussion July 11, 2018

The group enjoyed another stimulating exchange of views at its monthly meeting. The topic of the day dealt with the new nominee to the Supreme Court, Appellate Justice Kavanaugh. Most members agreed that on paper he was eminently qualified by virtue of education and experience. Questions arose, however, around the politicization of the process. Rather than focusing on the nominee's legal philosophy and ability to look at issues before the Court without regard for ideology, the Senate was fixated on how he might push the Court to the right and overturn what many regard as established constitutional law, particularly with respect to the abortion issue and voting rights. After a lively discussion, there was general condemnation of both political parties for dragging the Supreme Court into the ideological tug of war dividing the country. Our club then turned to the assigned topics for the meeting, digitization of the home and privacy; and the question of "reverse discrimination."

Home digitization came up as a topic because one member had been notified by Rockland Electric that a "smart" device would soon be installed to monitor energy usage. Are we losing any sense of personal privacy when even a local utility has the ability to monitor electric usage? The topic expanded to cover the whole range of digital observation, from closed circuit tv (cctv) observing everyone everyday somewhere to "Alexa" overhearing private conversations and occasionally acting independently. One member noted," <u>1984</u> has arrived." Although that may be an overstatement, the group broadly agreed that the idea of privacy was shrinking before our eyes. In many cases, especially among millennials, privacy is being surrendered voluntarily for the sake of social inter-connectivity. Like most rights, privacy will continue to erode as convenience and a sense of social belonging trumps the idea that "good fences make good neighbors." The speed of innovation and the potential profits associated with it as well as the potential for social and political control that digitization offers to authoritarian regimes will be powerful forces to overcome. Nonetheless, with some luck and public push back, the process may be slowed and a reasonable balance achieved.

The issue of "reverse discrimination" arose from a couple of Supreme Court rulings that colleges and graduate schools might use "race" as one of many criteria in making acceptance decisions. Diversity, not a racial quota, however, had to be the deciding criteria. (Bakke decision) Many members felt that "race" rather than diversity of the student body had become the over-riding determinant and that the result was discrimination against many qualified applicants. Discussion included trying to get at the heart of what makes for an education and what role does exposure to students from diverse backgrounds and ethnicity play. One member suggested the idea of "differentiation" rather than discrimination. Undoubtedly, the Supreme Court will re-examine this question as litigation against Harvard, brought by a group of Asian applicants denied admission, works its way up the court system.

The public discussion club will next meet on Wednesday, August 15th (the third Wednesday this month) at Larkin House (380 Godwin Ave) at 9:30 am. Our topics will be: Discussion of Artificial Intelligence and the work force; Tariffs; and MS13 and gang violence. All members are welcome to attend, even if just to listen.

HISTORY

n July 23, I presented the "ASIAN AMERICANS: IMMIGRANTS A SAGA." In the last 15 years, the Asian American Immigrants has the fastest growth of any major racial or ethnic group. It is estimated that there are 21.4 million Asian American Immigrants in 2016. Once upon a time, the Asians were considered an inferior race and unassimilable aliens and threat to the American society. The perception dissipated over the years and the American news media hailed them as poster children of American success and "model minority." The Asian Americans came from continental Asia and so immensely diverse, each group with unique culture, religion, language and other characteristics. Different stages of immigration covering more than 150 years, starting with the Chinese in the 1850's, followed by the Japanese along with the Asian Indians and Koreans in the late 1890's were discussed. Following the Spanish American war in 1898 and the acquisition of the Philippines after the bloody Philippine- American (1899-1902), the Philippines became a US colony, the Filipinos immigrated to Hawaii and the West Coast. In the very beginning of the Asian immigration, US immigration legislations and policies were severely discriminatory and prejudicial towards Asian. In 1882, the US enacted the Chinese Exclusion Act, the only US law that prohibit immigration on the bases of race. Total exclusion of the Chinese immigration lasted until 1943. In 1924 another US immigration legislation totally excluded all Asians except the Filipinos, they were classified as "Nationals" but cannot be citizen and has no rights. The Filipinos replaced the excluded Chinese, Japanese and other Asians as source of cheap labor.

In 1965, the US passed the Immigration and Nationality Act, also known as the Hart-Celler Act a very comprehensive Act that removed the quota system based on national origins. In removing the racial and national barriers the Act would significantly alter the demographic mix in the U.S. The Act impacted the immigration of the Asians tremendously. In general, the best and the brightest immigrated to the US, a phenomenon called brain drain. The Asians continued to contribute to the country, living the American dream in the greatest country in the face of the earth and very proud to be called Americans.

The Book Club

BOOK CLUB MEETING JULY 25, 2018

Darwin Comes To Town, by Menno Schiltuizen, was the first book up, introduced by Vince Tortorelli. A Dutch professor of evolutionary biology, the author writes about changes that have occurred with animal and vegetable species altered by urban development often over mere decades or a few hundred years rather than thousands or millions, much more quickly than Darwin even imagined. Citing numerous studies concerning individual species that over time have adapted from the wild to various city environments he describes how their habits and sometimes appearances become adapted to their new setting. He also professes that nature, as we tend to define it, and humans are the same, citing ant colonies, as city builders, and beavers, as changers of their environment, are just like us. It was pointed out that these adaptions in general are not groundbreaking news since we have lived with them as they have occurred, but they are varied and widespread.

Road to Valor, by Aili and Andres McConnon, summarized by **Joe Infosino**, is the true story of Gino Bartali, an Italian professional bicycle racer whose secret assistance saved Jews in Italy from the Holocaust during World War II. At the time, as the pre-eminent racer in Italy if not the world, having won the Tour de France in 1938, he cycled back and forth carrying forged documents for Jews to protect them from arrest and deportation by the Nazis. He later resumed his passion, again winning the Tour de France in 1948. The book was thoroughly enjoyed by the group, proving to be entertaining and informative.

Origin, by Dan Brown, was our third selection, recommended by **Bud Brooks**. In the popular style of this prolific author it is a lengthy pursuit, like the *Da Vinci Code*, of the answer to a riddle. Edmond Kirsch, a billionaire computer scientist, claims to have made a discovery that will shatter all religious belief and answer the question "Where do we come from? Where are we going?" His former professor Robert Langdon, aided by Ambra Vidal, the director of the museum where the discovery was to be announced, follow a tortuous trail and danger to track down the answers. Some in the group thought the book was a long run for a short slide, but to Dan Brown's numerous fans it should be entertaining.

This session was the last of our "season" since the Book Club does not meet in August, but all AU members are invited to join us when we regroup in September
