The Science Club will meet on Tuesday February 21st at 10:00 am on the second floor of Heneveld Hall. **Bob Zehm** will make an interesting presentation on jobs today; the relationship between jobs and machines / automation in the future; and a robot machine of the future. He will discuss how we create jobs in the present economic system and how we may do so in the future. He will show the functional design of a future general-purpose humanoid robot that can learn by reading, viewing, and can converse with humans and each other and compete for human jobs. Increased productivity brought about by advances in machines and the resulting reduction in jobs -- is this a threat or an opportunity? How will this change our economic system?

At the January meeting, **Walt Widmer** made an outstanding presentation on the human reproduction system, including why sexual reproduction is important to the evolution of life. He also discussed the anatomy of the human body's reproduction system for male and female, as well as sexually transmitted diseases, like HIV-AIDS. Walt also provided the 31 attendees a detailed handout with great graphics on the subject.



In January, **Joe Infosino** started things off with the Long Way Home (David Laskin). This interesting traced the lives of twelve book grants. Beginning with the harsh conditions in their native villages, we read of their grueling trans-Atlantic crossing, their difficult adjustment to life in the U.S., and, finally, their valorous service in WW1. Surprisingly, about twenty percent of the American Expeditionary Force was comprised of somewhat recent immigrants......Matterhorn (Carl Marlantes), a novel dealing with the Vietnam War, was recommended by Jerry Hulit. The author had been a platoon leader in Nam. His novel realistically described the intense, sometimes inane, battles fought by this Marine unit. Jungle fighting was nasty and perilous......A World Lit Only by Fire (Wm. Manchester), introduced by Walt Widmer, was a good overview of the 15th and 16th centuries. The author didn't break any new ground. He touched lightly on the early Renaissance and Humanist movement. The book did provide an easy to read description of Martin Luther and King Henry VIII, and the events leading up to their break with the Catholic Church. There was also an exceptional chapter on the world shaking exploits of Ferdinand Magellan.
