The Book Club

The Race to Save the Romanovs by Helen Rapaport, summarized by Vince Tortorelli, is the complex story of the fall, imprisonment and ultimate massacre of Tsar Nicholas II of Russia and his family in 1917 and the various attempts by various monarch families and governments in Europe to offer asylum in their countries. As her narrative unfolds Rapaport makes it fairly clear that all these efforts were doomed to failure. Though some desire was probably there because of family connections (the Tsarina Alix was the granddaughter of Queen Victoria of England and born into the Hesse family of Germany and cousin of Kaiser Wilhelm) the author states there were too many obstacles to overcome – tangled political alliances, poor communication facilities, impossible logistics as well as the existence of World War I and the developing Russian revolution. The book tracks the path the family is taken, first from the royal palace, then to western Siberia and finally to a secluded city in the Ural Mountains as the Bolsheviks grew concerned that monarchists were planning to free the family. At the end she even believes the Tsar would have never really left Russia if given the opportunity because of his abiding love of the country and the people, despite all the desperation, starvation, and his seeming lack of awareness of such conditions in the country during his reign. It is a well researched book by the noted Russian specialist and historian.

Janesville: An American Story by Amy Goldstein, reviewed by Marty Valerio, starts with the closing in 2008 of the nation's oldest General Motors assembly plant, started in 1923 in Janesville, Wisconsin. It then tracks the dire consequences that decision had on the town over the next few years, as people and families were faced with joblessness after generations of presumed lifetime jobs and secure pensions. It focuses on a few individuals and families as they tried to pick up the pieces, seek other employment, as well as enroll in a local community college to re-educate themselves in hopes of starting new careers, which too often proved unsuccessful. Others with some seniority were able to obtain positions in other GM plants hundreds of miles away in order to hopefully maintain employment long enough to retire with a pension, travelling home every weekend. The work is more than the story of a shuttered workplace and its aftermath; it is also a sorrowful human interest story.

Public Discussion Group

The group began its new year by sharing comments on the President's recent national address on immigration. Most participants felt there were no new facts revealed, but that the speech did highlight concerns over illegal immigration. The description of a "national emergency" was somewhat discredited by a review of some facts, which noted that illegal immigration had peaked in FY 2000 with 1.6 million arrests and were an average of 413 thousand under Obama. In FY 2018 arrests amounted to 396,579. It was also noted that visa overstays constitute the majority of illegals. What has complicated the situation on the border is the dramatic increase in the number of parents and families and unaccompanied children trying to enter the country. Also, the number of asylum seekers has increased tremendously and overwhelmed the capacity of the system to process them. Among the group there was broad support for the DACA group, most of whom had no ties to the country of their parents. While the group had no clear agreement on a solution, there was unanimity around the need for Congress to "get its act together" and address the problem.

The group next turned to "Gen Z", those born following the Millennials in the early 1990's into the 2000's. There was no clear consensus about how to define this demographic group, but a number of characteristics were offered. Gen Z has a sense of entitlement, as if the world owes them. Some members attributed this to a failure to instill competitiveness in youngsters, awarding prizes to everyone whether winning or losing. Just participating was enough to get a reward. It is true that a larger number of Gen Z live at home and are dependent at least in part on parental support, there are also many individuals in this group who are working long hours and earning big salaries. In addition, surveys suggest that this group is very open and inclusive-the opposite of selfish and self-centered. Some commented that parents had made similar remarks about them as "baby boomers" and that our perceptions might simply reflect the fact that the world changes and those changes can often seem uncomfortable. It was an interesting discussion with many points of view.

We then turned to the issue of automation and AI and their impact on jobs. The basic take-away was that the need for labor to perform routine work and even managerial work will decline at an accelerating rate. The job decline, even as new work might be created, will require a fresh look at our market economy. The historic role of labor in production and productivity will eventually vanish, while the output will likely increase. The big problem will then be not the allocation of resources, but the allocation of output/revenues. The distant future may hold the likelihood of "all play and no work."

As a final topic we discussed the objectivity of the "news." The conclusion was that objectivity is rare as news has become a highly commercial enterprise dependent on attracting the maximum number of viewers. Although "dog bites man" was never big news, it now seems that every event becomes a "breaking news report" of "man bites dog" proportions. The rise of social networks and 24 hour news have combined to exaggerate from simple weather events, like snow storms to comments from politicians that are transformed into "sound bites" generally taken out of context. All that seems to matter is creating enough controversy to grow the viewership and thereby the advertising revenue. Although there is no solution, it was suggested that we could all pay closer attention to our own biases when reading or viewing the news.

The Discussion Group will next meet on February 13th at 9:30 at the Larkin House. Topics will be: China's treatment of minorities; the relationship between China and the US (Does China pose an existential threat to the USA?); and what are the major threats facing the US, today and in the near future? All members are welcome.

The History Club



he topic of presentation was "Vladimir Vladimirovich Putin- the New Russian Tsar." The narrative opened with the accounts of Putin's early life who was born in Leningrad to a very poor family, his childhood, education and training as KGB agent. He was assigned as KGB counter-intelligence agent in Dresden, East Germany and witnessed the fall of Berlin wall in 1989. With the demise of Soviet Union in 1991- he declared that it was greatest geopolitical catastrophe of the 20th century. The presentation continued on discussing his rapid ascension into political power. After 4 years of joining President Boris Yeltsin's administration, his rise through the ranks was remarkable: Chief of Presidential Staff, Chief of FSB (predecessor of KGB) and finally Prime Minister of the Russian Federation in 1988. On December 31, 1999, President Yeltsin abruptly resigned and appointed Vladimir Putin as his successor. He was elected twice to a four-year term totaling 8 years.

In the beginning of his early presidency, he embraced capitalism, business, some "democratic reforms" and improvement of peoples living condition. Following 9/11, he provided early support to the United States on "war on terror." He talked about Russians as Europeans, share history with Europe and would like to align with the West including membership in NATO. What did the US and the West do in return?

President George W. Bush unilaterally withdraw from the 1972 Anti-Missile treaty, we expanded NATO into Eastern Europe, and encouraged the former constituents Soviet Republic to join as well.

Putin considered these situations as disrespect and insult to him and the Russian people. As the Prime Minister, he took personal charge of the second Chechnya war in 1999 and also invaded Georgia in 2008, the first war in Europe in the 21th century.

The Russian Federation constitution was amended in 2012 so he was able to run again; the president's term of office was raised from 4 to 6 years. He was re-elected in 2012, and according to international observers, election was rigged, oppositions were cracked down and the media/journalist were censored, threatened and some were arrested and put to prison. Putin blamed the West, foreign agents and blamed Hillary Clinton as well as instigator. Putin show-cased Russia in the Sochi Winter Olympic from February 7 to 23 at a cost of \$51 billion dollars, the most expensive ever spent on an Olympic event. While the Olympic event was going on, the Ukrainian Euromaidan Revolution or Revolution Dignity started and few days later and Crimea was annexed to the Russian Federation by Putin. Then the war in Eastern Ukraine started by the Ukrainian separatists backed by Russia, with Russian soldiers penetrating into the Ukrainian territory. The ceasefire was established on February 15, 2015. Putin was re-elected for another term of 6 years on March 18, 2018 with 77% of the vote. By the time Putin's term expire on 2024, he will have a 20 years term as president and 5 years as Prime Minister with total of 25 years. Joseph Stalin ruled the USSR for 24 years. Putin is authoritarian/dictator and the richest man in the world with net worth of \$200 billion dollars. From 2014-17, Forbes magazine ranked him the most powerful man in the world. Will Vladimir Putin restore Russia to the old glory, the "Imperial Destiny?" Communism- I do not believe so, because communism is a dead ideology. Stay tune!!!!
