#### The Science Club

t the December S/C Meeting, Dr. Ronald Cauchard (an Optometrist whose Office is in Wyckoff) gave us an outstanding discussion on the new and current approaches for testing and treating eye issues which are important for seniors. These included Macular Degeneration (both Wet and Dry), Glaucoma, and Diabetes, as well as, Cataract treatment. Central to the detection and control of all of these problems is elimination of Smoking, a Healthy Life Style (exercise and diet), and periodic eye examinations. Dr. Cauchard explained that proper blood flow in the eye is critical, and is maintained and improved by a healthy life style. He also indicated that Glaucoma is now a disease which, with early detection and medication, can almost be considered eliminated. Thank you Dr. Cauchard for you visit.

January 15, 2013—Jack Yurasek will give a talk on Gravity and the Fabric of the Universe. It is based on a book and PBS NOVA DVD by Brian Green, and the book 'Gravity' by Brian Clegg. The DVD will be shown along with a discussion on Gravity/Acceleration Equivalency, Warping of the Universe (based upon Einstein's Special Relativity), and Space /Time Diagrams.

**February 19, 2013—Walt Widmer** will give us a talk on how are our Liver and Kidney function, as well as the digestion process. Walt has given us many presentations on our bodies, and they are always excellent.

We are again seeking the aide of AU members who are willing to serve as volunteers in the AARP Tax Aide Program.



## The Chess Club


