On September 11, 2001, Brian Clark was on the eighty-fourth floor of the World Trade Center's South Tower when the second hijacked airplane slammed into the building six floors below him. Brian is one of only four individuals who survived from above the point of impact. During his descent he heard cries of help from within the eighty-first floor and successfully rescued a stranger who was trapped by debris. Brian's 9/11 story has been told in several documentaries including shows seen on NBC, the Discovery Channel, the History Channel, A&E and PBS/Nova.

Immediately following 9/11, Brian served as President of 'The Euro Brokers Relief Fund,' a public charity that raised millions of dollars to financially support the families of his company's sixty-one victims.

Brian has served as an Elder and a Deacon at The Wyckoff Re-

formed Church and is currently on the Board of Governors of Opportunity International, a global enterprise that provides micro business loans to the poorest of the poor in twentyfive developing countries. In 2004, Brian was recipient of the 'Norman Vincent Peale Award For Positive Thinking.'

Retired in 2006, after a thirtytwo year career on Wall Street, Brian and his wife Dianne live in Mahwah, New Jersey where they raised four children and now enjoy eleven grandchildren..

Let us make 2020 a great year for all of us involved in Activities Unlimited.



Public Discussion Group

The group began with a discussion of the "electoral college." One member provided the historical background at the Constitutional Convention that led to its creation. It is unique as a form of election and was intended to balance concerns about "mob rule" vs. dominance of the more populous states. The solution was an indirect election. Each state selects "electors" equal in number to its Representatives in the House (based on population) and Senators (equal for each state). Until the 17th Amendment in 1913, Senators were appointed by Governors and not directly elected. The argument for keeping the current system is that it prevents the most populous states from dominating an election; the contrary argument is that it nullifies the principle of "one man, one vote" by giving greater weight to electors from small states. (Each state has a minimum of 3 electors.) One suggestion that might satisfy the "equal vote" view with the "balance" view would be move from "winner take all" to proportional weighting to divide the respective state "electors." This would lessen the weight of smaller states, but at the same time reduce the impact of large states, e.g. Texas, California, Florida, New York, by potentially dividing their electoral votes. States could mandate this change without a Constitutional amendment.

Next topic was Articles of Impeachment. Two views emerged, of course. Some felt it was a case of an impeachment looking for an excuse since the start of the current Administration; others felt the only question was the specific facts of the Articles and whether they evidenced "abuse of power" and/or "obstruction of Congress." Regardless of the outcome - and impeachment in the House and a "not guilty" verdict in the Senate trial is likely- the process will have constitutional implications for future governance in term of Article I (Congress) and Article II (Executive) powers. For better or worse, it seems a painful process the country needs to go through.

Next meeting is on Wednesday, January 15th (day after the club's General meeting) at Larkin House at 9:30 am. Topics are: Strengths and Weaknesses of Democratic Presidential Candidates; and Restoring Civility to Political Discourse.

HISTORY

The topic was the history of the idea of race. **Tom Butler** presented a chronological look at how the term "race" came to be used as it was from the 18th century into the 20th century. The word itself was first used in the English language only around 1580. Up to the Middle Ages, culture in a broad sense was the consideration determining whether you were seen as belonging to a group. For the Greco-Roman period, it was language and world view; for the Romans, language and the law; for both the Islamic world for Muslims and for Christians through the Middle Ages, it was religious identity. Race was used as a term only to describe population differences that were understood to arise from geography and climate and not from any biological difference. During the age of exploration and discovery, naturalists continued using this approach up to the mid-1700's. The increased slave trade in the 18th century and the need to use slave labor on plantations in the New World precipitated the appearance of a new approach that used skull measurements and other physical measurements to define race. The belief in multiple creations, rather than a Darwinian single line of evolution, facilitated academic studies that found multiple races, biologically differentiated and hierarchically organized. The "white" race was at the top of this chart. The biologic view of race, magnified by theories of social Darwinism, gave rise to "scientific racism" and the practice of eugenics. It was a short slope from there to the horrors of Nazi ideology. The conclusion was that "race" is a social construction, given meaning by daily social interactions. It has no biological basis.

The History Club meeting is on January 27, 2020. Our speaker is **Al Connelly**, his topic of presentation is "The Weather Shapes History." Empire rise and fall with the changing weather. The empire that cannot deliver daily bread will soon be dead. Throughout history, fierce wind, raging monsoons and other adverse weather condition have changed the tides of entire civilization that affect our lives.

Proposed By-Laws Change

The following is a proposal to change the By Laws and add an item to the Policies, Practices and Procedures document.

The present wording in our By Laws does not allow a member to use our membership list for economic gain. Therefore, a member could not sell an item on the AU Network.

In accordance with the By Laws this proposed change must be printed in the Newsletter in January and February. We will vote on the change at the March meeting

The existing wording under **MEMBERSHIP**, Section 4, is as follows "No member is permitted to use the "Organization" or its membership list to solicit for economic gain in any way."

Proposed Wording

A member is only permitted to use the "Organization" and its membership list to sell an item to another member through the AU Network, provided the sale complies with the Policies, Practices and Procedures, Item 20.

Proposed new section to the Policies, Practices and Procedures

20. The AU Network is a digital message board where a member can contact other members with a request for information or an announcement that the member has something to give away or sell. This "contact of other members" is done through an email to all members on the mailing list.

Posting of an item for sale is subject to the following restrictions:

The item must be personally owned by the member.

The sale is done on a one-time basis.

A member may not post his personal business enterprises.

Commercial ventures cannot be posted.

No advertising of public companies is allowed.

An AU member shall be appointed by the Board to screen all items offered for sale for compliance with the above rules. If an item is rejected for posting, the member may appeal to the Board for a final decision.
