Public Discussion Group

June's meeting looked at Driverless Cars, Sanctuary Cities, and Tax Reform, any one of which could have taken up the full two hours.

Automated driving raised issues of safety, computer hacking, insurance liability and the impact on premiums (up or down?), the effect of this disruptive technology on employment and the effects on state revenues from traffic tickets and fees. The guesses for when we might see driverless driving ranged from 5-7 years to "not in our lifetime." It was a fascinating exchange around an emerging innovation.

The issue of Sanctuary Cities elicited a disparate range of views, including how do we define the term. Some saw it as a partisan refusal to enforce the immigration laws, which could undermine public safety and even promote terrorism. Others viewed it as a part of the larger issue of "immigration reform." Around 1914, immigrants accounted for 15% of the US population; following the restrictive laws of 1921 and 1924, the immigrant portion fell by 1970 to 5%. With the end of the quotas in the '70's, the immigrant population climbed again reaching about 13.5% in 2015. Among this group, Muslims constitute less than 1% of the total population. Current estimates are that this number will reach about 2.1% by 2050.

The final topic of Tax Reform also engendered a lively debate. Discussion focused on issues of "expenditures vs. revenue," impact of defense spending, the relationship between tax cuts and economic growth and the notion of fairness in crafting the tax code. All agreed the tax code was incomprehensible in its current form and cried out for reform. The next meeting will be on Wednesday, July 12th at Larkin House. Topics are: The tax code, tax filing relative to the "poor;" and the status of the "Russian investigation." All members are welcome.

The History Club

The topic for the July History Club meeting is "Yalta Conference" sometimes called Crimea Conference held in a L resort town on the Black Sea. The Yalta Conference held in February 1945 tells the story of how the three towering figures of the twentieth century: Franklin Delano Roosevelt, Winston Churchill and Joseph Stalin decided the fate of the world and in particular, the fate of Eastern Europe and Poland. Two months later, Stalin was strengthening his grip on Eastern Europe, FDR was dead and Churchill was on the verge of a humiliating electoral defeat.

For 72 years, opinion has been rancorously divided on whether FDR and Churchill failed. The conservatives who hated FDR"s New Deal accused him of selling out to the Soviet dictator. Was he to sick or did he gave away too much in exchange for Stalin's promise to join the war against Japan. Was Stalin the best informed and better prepared of the three leaders during the negotiation? His knowledge of his opponents' position thanks to his extensive espionage networks and his own outstanding skills as a negotiator no doubt gave him some advantage. Many historians have argued that Yalta Conference paved the way for the Cold War.

We were shown the many tools that Fidelity has to help select appropriate bonds to fill our needs, including income analysis, search, comparison, tax analysis, & ladder building tools. ETF, mutual funds, and closed end funds can also be useful tools for fixed income.

Fidelity showed that bond interest rates have been falling since the 1980s. Accompanying Federal Reserve graph shows this and compares it with the overall rate of inflation. Still the bond market is larger than the stock market by dollar volume. And a corporate AA 10 year is better than putting your money under your mattress where it earns nothing.

Re CPI – When it comes to Social Security the Feds talk about CPI x food and energy and get a nice low number. They mostly don't send Social Security checks to people who don't use food and energy.



The Book Club

P ooks for July:

- * A RAGE FOR ORDER THE MIDDLE EAST IN TURMOIL, FROM TAHRIR TO ISIS by Robert Worth
- * ENGINES OF LIBERTY by David Cole

* HOW TO FAIL AT ALMOST EVERYTHING AND STILL WIN BIG: KIND OF THE STORY OF MY LIFE by Scott Adams

Led off by **Joe Clinton** was a discussion of TEAMMATES (by David Halberstam) a gem of a book that tells the story of the enduring friendship of four baseball players: Ted Williams, Bobby Doerr, Dom DiMaggio and Johnny Pesky, the core of the Boston Red Sox from the late 1930's through the early 1950's. The author tells us a good deal about each one and how they interacted with one another and why their friendships lasted 60 years. The background to the book is a road trip to Florida by DiMaggio and Pesky in 2002 to visit Ted Williams who is dying of cancer, during which they reminisced about their lives in and out of baseball. Highly recommended.

CYBER WAR (by Richard Clarke) a book recommended by **John Galvin** is a powerful book about the challenges we face re cyber war, hackers, and the vulnerability of the Internet. The author cites some vivid examples such as Israel's successful raid on Syria's nuclear plant some years ago aided by their hacking of Syria's computers. Another example was No Korea's cyber attack of computers around the world in 2009 that infected 30 to 60 thousand computers. Clarke bemoans our lagging behind in dealing with these problems. Although members agreed the book was interesting and informative, some criticized the writing as a "very difficult read."

DESTINY AND POWER (by Jon Meacham) is a biography of George Herbert Walker Bush. The author describes Bush's formative years, his noteworthy military service, his marriage to Barbara, his success in the business world, and his various positions in government culminating in his presidency. One criticism Vince had was that Meacham perhaps presented a too flattering portrait of Bush, maybe the result of spending countless hours interviewing him.
