

The History Club meeting is on July 23 at 1 PM- 3rd fl. of WRC. The Immigration debate is a very hot issue for the past few months and the discourse is intense and fierce and became more chaotic since the Trump administration has introduced a "zero-tolerance" policy calling for the prosecution of all individuals who illegally enter the United States.

The immigration issue is difficult and a very complex problem. At the present, the President and Congress does not have a fair and coherent policy to deal with this most difficulty issue.

My topic for this presentation is "ASIAN AMERICANS: IMMIGRANTS A SAGA."

The U.S. Asian population grew by 72 % between 2000 and 2015, the fastest growth of any major racial or ethnic group. It is estimated that there are 21.4 million Asian immigrants in 2016. Once cast as unassimilable and inferior race who were threats to the United States, Asian Americans are now poster children of American success. The U.S.

news media hailed the rise of Asian Americans as supposedly the most educated, wealthiest and happiest and called them "model minority." But this depiction is misleading and one has to understand the reality and myth of a such a concept. It concealed the unstable place of Asian Americans in contemporary America. Depending on domestic economic and global political condition, some Asian Americans are accepted as full and equal citizens in the U.S. while others find themselves marginalized as dangerous outsiders. The simultaneous acceptance and rejection of Asian Americans reflects their complex place in contemporary American society as well the myth and realities of the so called "rise of Asian American and model minority." The U.S. Asian population is diverse coming from continental Asia, each with unique cultures, languages, histories and other characteristics.

**Public Discussion Group** 

#### June 2018

The morning discussion led off with a timely reading of the communiqué from the US-DPRK summit in Singapore. There was little commentary other than a collective sense of: "Is that all?" The summary leaves room for the denuclearization effort to extend over a long time period.

The group then turned to its agreed topics of the day. The question of health care as a right prompted a wide-ranging discussion. Some felt that the notion of "pursuit of happiness" necessitated access for all to minimum medical care; others highlighted the costs and the necessity to balance outcomes with financial burdens, either to taxpayers generally or to individual policy holders. There seemed to be a general consensus that such a system would require a single payer structure similar to the a European model. The topic may come up again as Obama care is gradually dismantled.

Next we examined the power of the President to make foreign policy. Here the issue was what role Congress should play. There was general agreement that Congress had failed in its oversight role by giving the executive too much latitude to use his authority to make war and enter into agreements that mimicked a treaty, but without the binding quality. Much of this came out of the experience of 9/11 and the need to empower the President to pursue terrorists. There was general agreement that Congress had abrogated its "power of the purse" and further legitimized the idea of an imperial presidency. No change to this pattern was expected because of the dysfunction of the legislative branch.

Finally, the group looked at the impact of self-driving cars. There was no agreement about how soon this new technology might be adopted-some thought soon; other, never. The main issues highlighted were safety (in light of recent test fatalities and broad reluctance to trust the artificial intelligence). Some members noted that this probably reflected a generational gap with adoption by younger drivers coming much sooner.

Looking to July's meeting, the group selected the following topics: the feasibility of solar panels in NJ; smart technology, e.g. home security systems, and privacy (Is Big Brother watching?); and finally, the pro's and con's of Artificial Intelligence. We will meet on Wednesday, July 11<sup>th</sup> at Larkin House at 9:30 am. All members are welcome to come.



### The Book Club

BOOK CLUB MEETING JUNE 27, 2018 Today's session brought a varied trio of publications that covered a range of subjects and emotion.

**Joe Pullaro** began the meeting with a summary of *The Rule of Nobody*, by Philip K. Howard. It is a critique of the regulatory process of our government which hampers efficient accomplishment through overly complex and numbingly detailed laws, to the extent that Howard claims that while officials have power, things don't get done because they are hampered by such regulatory rules that cause them to say "no" rather than "yes". He cites a number of examples in nursing homes, schools, and infrastructure projects. He then offers a set of his own Constitutional Amendments to clarify things, which may be debatable.

*The Immortal Irishman*, by Timothy Fagan, was then presented by **John Galvin**. It is the biography of Thomas Francis Meagher, a rising patriot and orator in Ireland during the late 1840's who galvanized the Irish in their struggle against an oppressive England at that time to the extent that England banished him to an Australian penal colony where he eventually escaped and fled to America. Meagher continued his passionate drive, serving as a brigadier general for the Union Army in the Civil War with hope of eventually forming an army that would free Ireland from the English. Fagan's work read like a novel, included a good deal of history, and brought to light the struggle and accomplishments of this inspirational Irish leader.

The third book discussed was *Sing*, *Unburied*, *Sing*, by Jesmyn Ward, and reviewed by **Marty Valerio**. This novel centers on a contemporary three-generation African American family struggling through life in Mississippi. There is 13 year old JoJo and his 3 year old sister Kayla, their chaotic drug-addicted mother Leonie, and the loving grandparents Pop and Mam. Leonie further complicates their lives by taking the children on a 2 day car trip to retrieve their white father who has just been released from prison. It is a tale of hardships and tenderness, with well defined characters.
