Computer Technology Club – June 19, 2019 Meeting

There were 25+ AU Members in attendance at the Wednesday, June 19, 2019 meeting of the Computer Technology Club. The meeting topics included a variety of items with the focus of the meeting being a deeper look at a comparison of two major cell phones IE: Apple's iPhone XR and the Samsung S10.

The meeting kicked off with a look at several technology-oriented videos and gadgets. The first was a look at a video on a product that eliminates walking into a home with dirty feet called **Cleanstep.** Next was a look at a unique way to clean large hard to reach windows called **Magnetic Window Cleaner**. Then we looked at part of a video on the **Future of Public Transportation**. And, lastly we looked at a video regarding a watch being developed by Microsoft the minimizes tremors in Parkinson patients that allows them to write.

Then we looked at several items included on the AU's website, new items added to the Computer Page Reference section and/or to the Helpful Tips section. We also, explored several other sections of the AU Website to let those in attendance know what is out on the AU Website. We are still looking at the suggestion made last month to organize the Reference Section alphabetically with a date presented.

Then we relooked at several aspects of last month's main topic a review of Cell Phones. We looked at several videos that did a comparison of the Apple XR to the Samsung S10 cell phones. Included in this section was a relook at how you can determine storage utilization on the cell phone and how you can make videos form your photos.

JUNE 26 BOOK CLUB MEETING

First discussed was the novel *Water for Elephants* by Sara Gruen, summarized by **George Lewis**. It is the story of two star-crossed lovers and an elephant in the circus circa 1932. Jacob Jankowski leaves veterinary school after his parents are killed in an automobile crash and almost by accident hooks up with a travelling circus, which hires him because of his animal experience. Here he falls in love with the beautiful performer Marlena, the wife of sadistic animal trainer August. The story depicts the typical routine of circus life along with its oddball characters and adds dimension with historical circus photographs. Halfway through we meet Rosie the elephant who conveniently understands Polish and connects with Jacob. The book was generally well received and prompted individual circus memories.

Next was *Sixkill* by Robert Parker and reviewed by **Frank Schwarz**. This work is the final Spenser crime story of Parker's prolific career. The title comes from the name of the Cree Indian former bodyguard of movie star Jumbo Nelson, the chief suspect in the mysterious death of Dawn Lopata, a groupie found in Nelson's bedroom. Spenser winds up investigating the mystery, he hires Sixkill to assist him, and the plot introduces a number of colorful characters. Parker's trademark writing of terse dialogue and snappy dialogue with his love interest Susan keep the story moving. With Parker having passed away in 2010 it is likely his legion of fans will certainly miss him.

Books for July:

How Democracies Die by Steven Levitsky

Deals with a 20 year study of a breakdown of democracy in several countries and that our democracy may be in danger of collapse.

Three Days in Moscow: Ronald Reagan and the Fall of the Soviet Empire by Brett Baier

Starts with Reagan's formative years and his political evolution and focuses on his fourth and final summit with Gorbachev in Moscow and his notable speech on democracy.
