Werner Koffler introduced the 1925 Willa Cather novel, The Professor's House, a short book with only three chapters. The first deals with the professor, at age 52, experiencing a mid-life crisis and how he deals with it, describing the emotional interplay among the professor, his wife, two daughters, and their husbands. The second chapter, almost a story in itself, is the story of two men, one of whom is destined to become the professor's favorite graduate student, and their discovery of ancient Indian ruins in New Mexico. Not only their exploration, but exploitation. The third chapter tries to tie everything together and falls a little short of this. Nevertheless, a wonderful book with insightful characterizations, interesting subplots, all written in simple but elegant prose.........

George Eckel gave a detailed account of Frederick Forsythe's spy novel, The Negotiator. This is a spy thriller with enough twists and turns to satisfy anyone interested in this genre.........

Gerry Hulit led the discussion of Destiny of the Republic, by Candice Millard, a true story of the assassination of President James Garfield. Garfield was a talented and capable man who would have made an excellent president if he hadn't been assassinated after only four months in office. The book delves deeply into the background and motives of Charles Guiteau, the assassin. Chances are Garfield would have survived the assassination attempt if he had not received such botched up medical treatment. Unfortunately for him, the American medical establishment had not yet adopted the European method of "antiseptic surgery." In fact, they ridiculed it, as they probed Garfield's wound with their unsterilized fingers and medical equipment, leading to all manner of infections, the ultimate cause of his death. The author also highlighted the glaring lack of security surrounding presidents up to that time. For instance, in going to an Exposition in Philadelphia, Garfield had to buy his own ticket and board the train the same as everyone else. Amazing.

t the May meeting, Bob Saletta made an excellent presentation on two topics related to Cosmology utilizing outstanding DVDs from the 'Teaching Company's' Great Course Series. The first entitled 'The Greatest Story Ever Told', is a scientific summary of the 14 Billion year history of the universe, from the Big Bang to the present. The second, 'The Hubble Deep Field', covers the method that scientists used to view very distant Galaxies formed shortly after the Big Bang, and included a discussion of the residual Microwave Background Energy that remains from the beginning of the Universe. Bob also distributed very useful and practical information on methods to prepare a Science Club talk. Bob has an extensive collection of 'Teaching Company' DVDs (with supporting text) which can be used for a presentation, and he would like members to contact him for their use.

Additionally, on May 3, an interesting trip to the Edison Laboratory in West Orange, NJ was made, with 13 S/C members and friends enjoying the visit. A Guide was provided for our group for a Tour to view the complex, that includes labs and exhibitions of Edison's inventions in the areas of Chemistry, Physics, and Metallurgy, as well as, displays of his phonograph, motion picture camera, and the 'Black Maria', the world's first movie studio.

The next Science Club meeting will be on Tuesday, June 19th, 2012 at 10:00 AM on the second floor of Heneveld Hall. Fred Theile will give a very timely talk on the topic of the 'War On Waste' (WOW). This is based upon Fred's experience in the Cosmetic Industry, where he directed the implementation of a 'Green' program, throughout the Procurement and Manufacturing phases of the business. Fred has a short DVD and PPT presentation, along with his talk.

The Science Club will not meet in July or August. Beginning in September, our subjects will include Population Growth problems (from 7 billion on earth now to 9 billion by 2050), with implications on Environmental issues, Fuel, Food, Potable Water, Housing, Jobs, and Housing.
