The History Club

On April 25, I presented Hiroshima and Nagasaki- Revisited. The turn out was quite large. The final eight months of the brutal War in the Pacific was presented as well as the development, testing and use of the atomic bomb. The critical decision of President Truman to use the atomic bomb was offered and scrutinized. The fundamental questions that have divided scholars and historians alike over the years are, whether the use of the atomic bomb was necessary to achieve victory in the Pacific and whether it played a role in the Japanese surrender. In my view, the atomic bombing accomplished both.

The entrance of the Soviet Union in the War in the Pacific by invading Manchuria 7 days before the Japanese announced its surrender to the Americans and its allies was also presented. At the end of the presentation, two World War II Veterans/Gentlemen; John Salmone a medic who served in the invasion of Okinawa and his ship was at Nagasaki 2 weeks after the bombing and Bob Mulligan who saw a lot of actions in the Pacific War shared their experiences with us. It was quite poignant and deeply moving. We salute them for their service to our country. This was followed by Q and A which was very informative, refreshing and very interesting, indeed. The question put forward to the group was whether the bombing was justified or not. The answer was unanimously, yes.

The next meeting will be Monday, June 27. The speaker is **Gerald Hulit** and he will be presenting The Early Years of Islam and its Spread.

THE LOVERS (Rod Nordland) recommended by **George Ekel**, is the true story of a young Afghan couple who violate strict cultural norms by eloping. He is a Shia from a Hazara tribe, she is a Sunni from a Tajik family. In this society, a woman is considered the "property" of her father/husband and subject to his dictates. The girl's family tries to track down the couple, always on the run, so they can perform an honor killing, and thus restore "honor" to the family. The author describes in great detail the intractable problem of violence against women in this country and holds out little hope for cultural change in this regard even though theoretically it is against the law...........In THE NINE (Jeffrey Toobin) introduced by **Tom Butler**, we get an intimate look at the diverse group of justices who served on the Supreme Court from 1992 - 2007. While most justices remain true to their liberal/conservative philosophy after being appointed to the court, a fairly significant percentage veer off in totally unexpected directions. The author, who has a broad knowledge of the Court's workings and the various justices, provides a glimpse into the interplay among the justices. A very revealing and timely look at one of our most important institutions.........THE LONGEST WINTER (Alex Kershaw) recommended by **Joe Clinton**, discusses the Battle of the Bulge while focusing on one highly decorated platoon that helped stall a German Panzer attack for twelve hours, gaining critical time for the Allies in that sector to regroup. The author goes on to discuss the travails of that platoon as they become prisoners of war, detailing the horrendous conditions that POW's were subject to in the various prison camps they journeyed through.

Public Discussion Group

The June meeting will be held Wednesday June 15th, 9:30 AM at the Larkin House

Discussion Group, May, 2016 BRIEF SUMMARY

Before starting on the agreed topics, there was a brief discussion about the structure and role of the electoral college in selecting a president. The group then moved on to a discussion about Cuba. In general, the group felt that normalizing relations was a reasonable step but was late in coming due to the influence of the Cuban community on Florida and national politics. Issues like confiscated property and human rights remain open, but with increased tourism and external contact growing and in light of the age of Cuban leaders, change toward greater individual freedoms seems inevitable. The group then turned its attention to the question of women in the military. Here there were mixed views. Some noted the success of the Israeli military in integrating women into the fighting forces, including combat roles. Others felt that attitudes toward women were wired into the DNA of humans and women in a combat situation would be a distraction. The general consensus seemed to favor allowing women to take whatever role they were qualified whether combat or non-combat, especially since the military academies were now graduating outstanding female cadets. The third topic was a controversial one, namely transgender access to public restrooms. This became a national issue when the North Carolina legislature passed a law requiring everyone to follow their birth certificate gender with respect to bathroom use. The federal government then "doubled down" by certifying that "transgender" was a qualifying "sex category" under Title IX and therefore qualified for non-discrimination treatment. Clearly, this will end up before the Supreme Court for adjudication. In the meantime, the discussion group took up the question. Some argued that "transgender" was a mental condition that could be addressed/corrected by psychiatric treatment. Others pointed to the medical research into "nature's mistake" of releasing the "gender" hormones into the wrong anatomy, thus creating a transgender template. Uncorrected, this mix-up leads to gender confusion, isolation and depression and a high incidence of suicide. Should "transgender" be viewed as a type of birth defect? No conclusions were reached, but the group had a chance to think about the serious questions raised.
