The History Club



On April 23, **George Lewis** presented "How Muslim immigration affected Europe and the rest of the world." At the beginning of the presentation, George recognized the accomplishments of the Islamic world in mathematics, science, economic development and culture from the 8th to the 14th century. The magnitude of his talk was concentrated on the last 100 years of Muslim immigration to Europe. He proposed the following questions:

- 1) Is immigration a problem today?
- 2) Is radical Islam a problem today? and;
- 3) Is immigration a bigger problem today than it was 100 years ago? In recent years, Europe experienced a record number of asylum seekers fleeing the civil war in Syria and other immigrants from predominantly Muslim countries in the Middle East as well as Pakistan, India, Afghanistan, Bangladesh and Africa. They came to Europe for other reasons such as finding job and better economic opportunities and education seekers as well. The wave of Muslim immigration prompted debate about immigration and security policies in the European Union and the future number of Muslims in Europe. It is believe that if one stop the immigration today, the Muslim population will continue to grow outpacing the white Europeans because they were younger and bore more children compared to the former.

A very important question was pertaining to the "radicalization" of the Muslim immigrants. It is estimated that there are some 25 million Muslims in Europe. France, Germany, Norway and Switzerland has the largest Muslim immigrants in proportion to its population but the United Kingdom has the biggest Muslim population. After the presentation, Q and A followed. The burning question is what percentage of the Muslim immigrants are radicalized? Few people in the audience gave their thoughts and estimates but no body knows for sure the actual percentage, but what ever it might be, it is small. Vast majority of Muslims are good people and law abiding citizens. Sharia law was briefly discussed. It is the Islamic canonical law based on the teachings of the Koran prescribing both religious and secular duties and sometimes retributive penalties for law breaking.

The next History Club meeting is June 25 at 1 PM- 3rd fl. WRC. The topic: "Asian American- A Saga."



The Book Club

The first book on the agenda was *The Locals*, by Jonathan Dee. Introduced by Vince Tortorelli it is the story of the residents who live in the fictional small town of Howland located in the Berkshires in Massachusetts. Populated by largely middleclass, traditional citizens, who nonetheless possess individual personalities, the town finds itself altered when a wealthy hedge fund manager who owns a rental property there moves his family from New York city into it right after the World Trade Center attack. Following the loss of a large tax ratable, the fund manager begins subsidizing town expenses to try to maintain his idea of tranquil life, but to little satisfaction of the citizenry. In a somewhat inverted twist, the personalities as described by the author in the book seem to be more entertaining than the storyline.

Up next was *The Line Becomes A River* by Francisco Cantu and presented by George Lewis. The author describes his work as an agent in the U. S. Border Patrol tracking down migrants that cross the border from Mexico, discovering bodies that didn't survive the blistering sun and rounding up others into detention centers that did. A rather straightforward account of the difficulties managing the U.S. southern border, with the book ending with a poignant account of the deportation court hearing of Jose, an illegal immigrant who befriended the author while working productively for years in the U. S. Commentary regarding the book itself was tepid mostly due to the routine nature of Cantu's job which took most of the story, but as expected, the subsequent discussion regarding the overall illegal immigrant situation and possible resolutions was lively.

At The Existential Café: Freedom, Being, and Apricot Cocktails, by Sarah Bakewell was up next, summarized by Tom Butler. In this work the author delves into existentialism, the philosophical view that is based on the doctrine that concrete, individual existence takes precedence over abstract, conceptual essence and that humans are totally free and responsible for their acts. And it is this responsibility that is the source of their dread and anguish. Bakewell traces the lives, influences and thoughts of the more notable philosophers of the movement, focusing on its chief proponents Jean-Paul Sarte and Simone de Beauvoir. The title refers to the cafes in Paris where many of them endlessly discussed their philosophy. Not the easiest read, but very provocative.
