# Notice of Proposed Changes to Article VI (Nominating Committee) of the AU By-Laws

#### Explanation:

The Executive Committee is recommending some timing changes to Article VI of the club's by-laws in order to move up the election of officers from December to November. The reason for the change is to ensure that the election takes place before the annual December Holiday Dinner Dance. The club has often presented the new officers and "passed the gavel" before formal voting for new officers took place. The recommended changes will avoid this situation. New officers will still enter into their office on January 1<sup>st</sup>.

Approval of the changes noted below will be by majority vote of members at the General meeting on June 11<sup>th</sup>.

#### ARTICLE VI: NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Section 1. No changes to the existing text.

#### Section 2.

The Committee shall select a slate of officers to be presented at the October meeting. Members may make additional nominations from the floor at this meeting.

#### Section 3.

The nominated slate of officers shall be presented again at the November meeting. Additional nominations may be made from the floor at this time, after which nominations will be closed. The election of new officers by voice vote shall proceed. However, if there is more than one nominee for a particular office, voting shall be done by ballot.

#### Section 4.

The slate of duly elected officers shall be presented at the December meeting (the Annual Meeting) and will take up office effective January 1.

# **The History Club**



For the May History Club meeting, the speaker was Carver Washburn. The topic was" Amateur Radio Communications: the last Resort (When all else fails)." Carve is a trained, experienced and licensed Amateur Radio (Ham Radio) operator. His presentation started with the narrative on the origin of the "Ham Radio" and described the use of radio frequency spectrum for the purposes of non-commercial exchange of messages, wireless, private recreation, radio sport and emergency communication. The operator of the "Ham Radio" is duly authorized person interested in radio electric practice with a purely personal aim and without commercial interest. There is no age limit, the interest world wide in this field continued to climb. Prospective amateur operators are tested for their understanding of key concepts in electronics and government's radio regulations. The radio amateurs use a variety of voice, text, image and data communications modes and have access to frequency allocations throughout the RF spectrum. This enables communications across a city, region, country and the world, or even into space.

The main focus of Carver's presentation was centered on the critical role of the Amateur Radio operator (Ham Radio), played following the horrific 9/11 attack on the World Trade Center, the attack on the Pentagon and in Pennsylvania. Immediately following the attack on the World Trade Center, communications ceased to function since most of the transmitter, etc. were destroyed. The NYPD, the NYFD and NY Emergency Medical Services and the Office of Emergency Management could not communicate with one another. The Amateur Radio operators mobilized within five minutes of the World Trade Center attack. They provided the information/communications necessary and magnificently without any required communications infrastructure to the police department, fire department, emergency medical services, office of emergency management, hospitals and red cross. The same necessary communications/information were provided to Pentagon and the disaster in Pennsylvania as well. These Amateur Radio operators supplied all the information/communications for many days following the 9/11 attack. They help in supplying information also in other disasters like weather, fire, flood, etc. They provided invaluable information during the superstorm Sandy.

Carve is also involved in his town of Wayne which is prone to flooding by providing information to police, ambulance and emergency services. Questions and answers followed the presentation.

## **Public Discussion Group**

#### Summary of Discussion Group Meeting, 15 May 2019

The group enjoyed a lively and informative exchange of views at its latest meeting. The first topic, which took up most of the meeting's time, looked at the pro's and con's of the Trump presidency after two years. Perhaps predictably, those who support the President enumerated several points, such as the tax law changes, faster economic growth, reduction of regulations and efforts at immigration policy changes as significant accomplishments. Those who viewed Trump negatively interpreted these "accomplishments" in a negative light. The discussion was revealing as it showed how events could lead to very different interpretations. Pro-Trump speakers pointed out how corporate tax reductions and regulatory rollback turbo-charged the economy. Opponents noted how the tax changes deepened the economic divide and while the stock market has continued to rise, less that half the population owns stocks, either directly or through a retirement fund. Regulatory changes have helped some companies, but often at the cost of increased risk to health and safety. Some viewed the withdrawal from international commitments like the "Iran Agreement, the TPP and the Climate Accord, as good for America; others viewed it as short sighted and harmful to American interests. It's unlikely that any basic views were changed, but it was a valuable airing of opinions that enlightened without offending.

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#### Summary of Discussion Group Meeting, 15 May 2019 (continued)

We next turned to the question of dealing with aging, especially with respect to assisted living. The main focus here was on the extremely high cost of being in assisted care and its virtual inaccessibility in the absence of a good "long-term care" insurance policy. There are a few church related, charitable organizations that have more reasonable fees, but demand outstrips supply. Otherwise, it's use up your assets and then go on Medicaid. There was general agreement among the group that getting older would continue to be a challenge. Finally, the group looked at the thorny question of "reparations," an issue that has recently surfaced in the primary run up to next year's election. Some felt reparations for the harms of "slavery" were unwarranted because the Civil War had taken place so long ago and many benefits had already been put in place. Others pointed to long lasting effects of slavery on family formation and economic advancement. Some noted that slavery had continued by other means, i.e. the "Jim Crow" period following Reconstruction when almost all efforts at integration and economic improvement were thwarted by discriminatory practices and outright violence. While both sides have some merit, almost all agreed that the practicality of implementing such a program and quantifying who and how much would be impossible- and then what about the Native Americans? On the whole, a quite fascinating sharing of views.

For the June meeting on **Wednesday, June 12<sup>th</sup> at 9:30 am at Larkin House**, the topics will be: 1. the impact of Muslim population growth on a) Europe and b) the USA in terms of culture and law; 2. The US relationship with Iran; and 3) the impact of the Administration's proposed budget on "safety net" programs. All members, especially first timers, are welcome to come to the meeting.
