Public Discussion Group

Walter Widmer was unable to moderate the group's meeting and Tom Butler substituted this one time. In Walter's absence, the group enjoyed a smorgasbord of topics, excluding for a change many of the political issues that usually dominate. We began with a lively discussion about "the French and why they dislike Americans." Many members shared personal experiences- and most of those were fond memories of good times in France. By the end, the negative topic transformed into a broad view that the French, despite some peculiarities like tolerance for mistresses, were not so different from other Europeans as a far as friendliness was concerned.

There was a brief discussion around the Olympics and the security cordon around the events: little or no tolerance by the Russian authorities for any sign of dissent.

Getting back to politics, there was lively discussion about the extent and validity of "executive orders." The general view was that President's use of executive orders was not any more numerous than predecessors' use of them and approval or condemnation of them was probably more dependent on the political leanings of the viewer than the constitutionality of the practice. There was also a short discussion about gerrymandering and its impact on the electoral process. There was a general sense that "government by the people" was slipping away.

Finally, we talked about curriculum in the schools and whether the country was over-focused on just preparing students for a job and spending enough time on the arts and humanities, in short, not providing a really well-rounded education. No conclusions drawn and lots of room for future debate..

The next meeting will be on Friday, March 21st. In a change to the usual format, the group voted to invite a guest to address the group about the "Tea Party." Many participants have lamented the fact the group debates important issues, but doesn't have a clear idea of how to bring ideas to a wider audience or to elected officials. The purpose of the invitation is to get a better idea of how a "movement" organizes and pushes an agenda forward. This will not be a partisan presentation of Tea Party views, but will focus on how a civic organization is formed and becomes effective.

New discoveries are changing the probabilities to 'maybe yes'. (b) The Higgs Boson particle which is the fundamental particle in the universe. It has been theorized since 1964 and 'partially' discovered this year, and has been called the 'God Particle', since without it, the universe would not exist.

Pooks for March:

Vince Tortorelli briefed us on Zbigniew Brzezinski's latest book, STRATEGIC VISION: America and the Crisis of Global Power. Brzezinski sees a shifting of world power from the West to the East, abetted by a weakened European Union and America's domestic economic and political problems. This dispersal of power will see Russia, China, India and Japan all maneuvering for position. He holds out hope that the U.S. will regain its footing and help promote a more vital West, one embracing Turkey and a more democratized Russia. This analysis led to a lively discussion............John Oates gave a spirited review of THE ART FORGER (B.A. Shapiro), a novel based on a real-life 1990 theft of art work by Rembrandt, Degas and Vermeer. The plot involves a Faustian bargain made by a struggling, but talented, painter, who agrees to make a forgery of a Degas painting for money and, more importantly, an opportunity to have a one-woman show of her paintings at an art gallery whose nefarious owner is the one offering her this "deal." This is a light read, but most fascinating about the book is its description of art copyists and forgers and how, possibly, countless forgeries hang in the world's most prestigious art museums. Who knew?........Ed O'Keefe outlined Paul Theroux's latest novel, THE LOWER RIVER. Ellis Hock, the central character, following a divorce and other unhappy circumstances, decides to return to a rural village in Malawi, Africa, where he served in the Peace Corps forty years earlier. However, it is no longer the ideal place he remembered. It is now a corrupt and hellish place where he eventually finds himself a "prisoner" of sorts. The story telling is full of descriptive details and makes Hock's predicament seem quite scary, although one our members, who has visited Malawi, took issue with the author's heavy handed description of the country.
