Proposed Amendment to AU By-Laws

The Executive Board has approved the following amendment to the By Laws of Activities Unlimited to be submitted to the membership for a vote. The amended wording is underscored below.

By-Laws, Article VIII, Section 5.

Any member in good standing as of December 31, 2015 and who attains the age of 90 by January 1 of the membership year is no longer required to pay annual dues. Members joining after December 31, 2015 and reaching the age of 90 or more will continue to pay the then established annual dues.

Background:

AU is fortunate that an ever increasing number of our members remain active in their nineties and beyond. We can estimate that, in the future, continuing to exempt a larger number of such members from paying annual dues would adversely affect the revenue needed to support AU activities. In such case, an increased amount of annual dues would be required of all other members. The policy of exempting members 90 and older from annual dues will continue for all members in good standing as of December 31, 2015. It is anticipated that a membership vote on the amendment will be taken at the April General Membership meeting, which follows publishing the proposed amendment in two issues of the AU Newsletter.

The group also discussed the significance of the timing of the caucus or primary dates, the issue of "proportionality" vs. "winner take all" and what happens if no candidate has a majority after the 1st ballot at the respective Conventions. Although it's a complex and confusing process, by the end of our meeting everyone had a better sense of how it works. Around this lengthy discussion, the group also talked about the meaning of the terms, "Conservative" and "Liberal," the significance of the Supreme Court vacancy and of course, a little bit of Trump. The meeting was lively, informative and fun.

The next meeting will be on Friday, March 18th at Larkin House at 9:30 am. Discussion topics will be: "What is causing gridlock in Congress?" and "Is the Constitution a living document?"

Investment Study Group February Field Trip

Eleven members attended a presentation by Fidelity Investments in Paramus on Feb. 11. Mr. John Gagliardi, a Fidelity VP, gave the presentation. He covered analysis & trading tools and the research and education facilities offered by Fidelity. Some points from Mr. Gagliardi's presentation:

- The advantage of the individual active investor is ease of getting in and out of markets and shifting asset classes. It is more difficult with mutual funds, ETFs and annuities.
- The individual investor needs business & trading plans.
- Trading plans need to include risk management such as rules for Stop Loss Orders and price targets.
- The individual investor should plan to spend one hour per month on each ETF and one hour per week on each stock. This time is spend reading news about stocks and sectors, selecting, reevaluating, and possibly resetting Stop Loss and Limit orders. It's a JOB.
- Scale in and out of trades.
- Be aware of the overall world and national situation, like yield curves, interest rates, & stock price of Campbell Soup (CPB) vs. S&P 500. His rule was that when Campbell's out performs the S&P times are bad. BTW over the last three months he is spot on.

CPB up **20.60%** S&P down **8.19%**
