He will describe the latest research on how* caring for our brain as well as lifestyle factors may affect our physical and cognitive health. We will find out how to incorporate healthy habits into our everyday routine to improve our sense of well-being-at any age.

Dr. Bennett P. Leifer is a diplomat of the American Board of Internal Medicine, both in internal medicine and added qualifications in geriatric medicine. Dr. Leifer attended Brown University where he received a bachelor of arts in biomedical ethics before obtaining his medical degree from the State University of New York-Upstate Medical College in Syracuse, New York. He completed his internship and residency in internal medicine at Hartford Hospital in Hartford, Connecticut. He subsequently completed a fellowship in geriatric medicine at the Mount Sinai School of Medicine. Since 1991.

Dr. Leifer has been in private practice in internal medicine and geriatrics as an attending physician at The Valley Hospital. For the past 15 years, he's been listed in New York magazine as one of the best doctors in geriatric medicine. Dr. Leifer is also a frequent lecturer and educator in the community on Alzheimer's disease and the management of patients with dementia.

Currently, Dr. Leifer is the Director of the Transition of Care Consultative Service of Valley Medical Group and is the Medical Director of Van Dyk Health Care at Ridgewood.



He was a World War II veteran who served under General Patton. He could go on about his boss (the General), post-war prison camps, and a Russian Colonel.

The members took up two interesting and timely topics: DACA; and the Muslim impact on Europe. We noted that the issue of how to deal with the DACA population (children illegally brought to the US by their parents) has created a dilemma. This group of 800,000to1.8 million individuals is technically here illegally. However, these children, many now adults, grew up in the US, have had few if any contacts with the country of their birth and in many cases don't even speak the language. Many have also started families and have children who are US citizens. There was a general consensus in the group that it would be wrong to deport these "almost Americans" and that there should be some path to citizenship available. There was general agreement that any solution should also include stronger border security and better tracking of visitors in order to lessen the likelihood that this situation would re-occur. Most agreed that there should also be stringent enforcement of e-verify practices. Although regularizing the DACA population would be unfair to those following the rules and waiting to emigrate, the practical reality is that the vast majority of Americans don't want to see these "quasi-citizens" rounded up and deported. Most also felt that a solution should not be linked to a broader revision of immigration laws. Those changes should be debated on their own merits.

Turning to the second topic, many members felt that Islam was undermining western civilization and that Europe provided a clear example of the impact a rising Muslim population has had. Some discussed "no go zones," rising crime rates, unwillingness to learn the language and generally an antithetical culture that could not be integrated. Other members noted that there was little factual evidence for many of these assertions. Generally, members felt that the problems were generational, and not so different from the reaction in the US to waves of foreign immigration into the US. Most seemed to feel that after a generation or two, most of these Muslim immigrants would indeed fit into the broader culture and society. It was also noted that the level of immigration was exceptional because of civil wars in the Middle East and Africa. The numbers were overwhelming and strained social services. Time will tell if Europe can absorb these numbers and maintain its traditional cultural identity.

Public Discussion next meets on Wednesday, March 14th at Larkin House at 9:30 am.

The History Club



On February 26, I presented the "The War of 1812- Between the United States and Great Britain." This conflict is the most obscure war that the United States has ever fought. The reasons being there was no great president associated with it nor great generals and the causes for war were complex and still subject to debate. The events leading to and the causes for war were presented. The war was fought in 3 different regions of North America: 1) the Northern frontier with Canada and the Great Lakes, 2) the Northeastern Atlantic coast, and 3) the Southwest. The Canadians and Native Americans played a major role during the war. The war started on August 18, 1812 and ended on February 17, 1815 when the Treaty of Ghent was ratified by the British and the US governments. The treaty did not resolved nor address the major issues causing the war, that is Impressment and Maritime Neutral rights violation. It just maintained the "status quo- antebellum" the state of affairs that existed before the war. Historians believe that neither the Americans nor the British won the war, it is a draw. There were no territorial gains or lost by either side. The war had a greater impact on Canada.

In 1812 the various provinces in Canada was populated by a combination of French Canadians, native-born British subjects, Loyalists who fled from the United States, and American who migrated across the border in search of greater economic opportunities. It helped forge a common bond among these groups and shaped Canada's future, first as a loyal outpost of the British Empire and then as independent nation. The greatest losers were the Native Americans. After they lost the war in the Northwest and Southwest against the Americans, the Indians never recover from this blow.

The Book Club

This meeting was a little different in that 2 books from the same author were on the agenda.

Ninety Eighty-Four by George Orwell (pen name for Eric Arthur Blair), reviewed by **Vince Tortorelli**, was published in 1949 and takes place in what was formerly Great Britain but is now called Airstrip One in the territory of Oceania. It traces the activity of Winston Smith, a citizen of a totalitarian government who works in the Ministry of Truth with a main job of rewriting past newspaper articles to represent the Party's current agenda. Winston secretly hates the party and with his newfound love Julia dreams of rebellion. Subsequently arrested after being discovered via "thought crimes" he is tortured by O'Brien, whom he erroneously believed to be a fellow conspirator, and ultimately succumbs to the doctrine.

This led into Orwell's other novel in our session, *Animal Farm*, which was published in 1945 and also treats the same general subject of life under a totalitarian state. Summarized by **Joe Pullaro**. it is ostensibly a fairy tale of life as animals under such conditions, as Orwell writes a biting satire on the Russian Revolution and communism. The animals revolt against the farm owner and take charge of the land, creating a hierarchy among the group, which over time becomes more repressive and self-serving than the original scenario. Discussion elicited a wide perspective among those present, some expressing their strong praise of the works, others not necessarily so, and thoughts on the books relevancy not only during the times they were published but also today.

Win Bigly, by Scott Adams, was presented by **John Galvin**. This work, too, delves into political and social environments, in another context. The author deals with the art of persuasion, using Donald Trump as Exhibit I. Referring to Trump as a master persuader, he discusses how Trump talked his way into the White House and ultimately gets attention and often results by offering simple solutions to more complex situations. A main point of his is that facts don't work today because most people now have their own "facts" that become solidified by listening chiefly to those who share the same point of view with the same information.

Our next meeting will be Wednesday March 28 at 9:30 in the Memorial Room of the Wyckoff Reformed Church when we will discuss *The Sixth Extinction* by Elizabeth Kolbert, *The Strange Death* of Europe by Douglas Murray, and *The Voice of the Violin* by Andrea Camilleri.
