
Activities Unlimited General Meeting Tuesday, March 12, 2019 — 1:00 PM at the WRC, Heneveld Hall

Rob writes a monthly Q and A cannabis column for the Spokesman-Review, gives seminars and has lectured at Stockton University. Notice of Proposed Changes to Article VI (Nominating Committee) of the AU By-Laws

Explanation:

The Executive Committee is recommending some timing changes to Article VI of the club's by-laws in order to move up the election of officers from December to November. The reason for the change is to ensure that the election takes place before the annual December Holiday Dinner Dance. The club has often presented the new officers and "passed the gavel" before formal voting for new officers took place. The recommended changes will avoid this situation. New officers will still enter into their office on January 1st.

Approval of the changes noted below will be by majority vote of members at the General meeting on June 11th.

ARTICLE VI: NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Section 1. No changes to the existing text.

Section 2.

The Committee shall select a slate of officers to be presented at the October meeting. Members may make additional nominations from the floor at this meeting.

Section 3.

The nominated slate of officers shall be presented again at the November meeting. Additional nominations may be made from the floor at this time, after which nominations will be closed. The election of new officers by voice vote shall proceed. However, if there is more than one nominee for a particular office, voting shall be done by ballot.

Section 4.

The slate of duly elected officers shall be presented at the December meeting (the Annual Meeting) and will take up office effective January 1.

The History Club



At the February meeting Murry Pearl presented:

The American Eugenics Movement and the Nazi Final Solution

The presentation began with a discussion of the social and scientific influences leading to the establishment of the Eugenic Record Office (ERO) by Charles Davenport in Cold Spring Harbor NY. Davenport and his assistant, Harry Laughlin began keeping tens of thousands of records of family trees to track individuals with defective traits that might be passed on to future generations.

Laughlin travelled the country promoting the sterilization of 'criminals, idiots, imbeciles and rapists' to prevent the procreation of undesirable persons. In 1907, Indiana became the first state to conduct involuntary sterilizations.

Positive eugenics was also promoted by encouraging potential mates to pair with only those without 'degenerate' characteristics.

Henry Goddard, the superintendent of the New Jersey Home for the Education and Care of Feeble-Minded Children in Vineland New Jersey, introduced intelligence testing in the US. Immigrants and army conscripts were tested and the data was collected to categorize the intelligence of various racial and ethnic groups. Goddard also followed the family tree of the Kallikak family illustrating how degenerate traits were passed from generation to generation.

In 1916, the Superiority of the Nordic race was proposed by Madison Grant, who saw the influx of 'Mediterranean' blood as a threat to the racial purity of earlier Anglo-Saxon immigrants. He also aggressively pursued a sterilization policy in California.

Pressure was put on Congress to curtail immigration from southern and eastern Europe leading to the Immigration Restriction Law of 1924.

Laughlin turned his efforts to secure judicial support for sterilization in 1927. In the precedent-setting case of *Buck* v. *Bell*, Supreme Court Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes, Jr., upheld the Virginia sterilization law.

As scientific knowledge advanced, many scientists, physicians, and political leaders began to denounce the eugenic work of the ERO publicly. After considerable reflection, the Carnegie Institution formally closed the ERO at the end of 1939.

In the early 1930s Germany adopted American measures to identify and selectively reduce the presence of those deemed to be "socially inferior" through involuntary sterilization.

Adolph Hitler adapted the work of Madison Grant and incorporated his thoughts into his manifesto, Mein Kampf. The Nazis escalated their policy of eliminating defective genes from the population from sterilization to 'euthanasia' with project *Aktion T4* by killing 300,000 mental patients. In 1935 Hitler passed the *Law for the Protection of German Blood and Honor* forbidding marriage extramarital intercourse between Jews and Germans, leading to the 'final solution to the Jewish problem' in 1941.

The presentation concluded with an analysis of how the eugenics movement perverted science in an effort to promote political, social and racial goals.
