At the May Executive Committee meeting the Board approved the below amendments to the By Laws.

In accordance with By Laws Article XI "Amendments" the by laws must be published in two prior Newsletters (in this case June and July) and announced at one General Meeting (June) before members vote at the September General Meeting.

#### Below is a listing of the proposed amendments to the current By Laws presently posted on the AU Website:

Page 5. By Law, Article III Duties of Officers, Section 6 Assistant Treasure. Deleted Care and Concern responsibilities noted in Section 6.4 due to an overlap of responsibilities with the Cares and Concerns Committee; see Article IV: Appointees, Section 3.2. Section 6 renumbered.

Page 7. Requirements for Cares and Concerns are mentioned twice, once in the By Laws and once in the Policies, Practices, and Procedures. To consolidate the requirements, the language in Policies, Practices, and Procedures Item 14, with modifications, was incorporated into By Laws, Article IV Appointees, Section 3.2 Cares and Concerns.

Page 7. By Laws, Article IV Appointees, Section 3.2, the chairman of the Cares and Concerns Committee shall be appointed each January by the President.

Page 7. Added By Laws, Article IV Appointees, Section 3.2.4; there is no term limit for the Chairman position.

Page 8. By Laws, Article IV Appointees, Section 3.3 Communications Committee; Section 3.3.3.3 establishes a procedure to notify membership of an active member's passing.

Page 9. The Newsletter Editor position was moved from Policies, Practices, and Procedures to By Laws, Article IV, Section 4.0.

#### To Members: The Executive Committee requests your support in the approval of these amendments. Mark your calendar to attend the September General Meeting. Members can attend as many times as they want to show their support.

An amended copy of the By Laws, dated September 10, 2024 will be posted in the Archive section of Web page for review before voting at September's General Meeting.



Here are some other things I would have told him about my childhood, if I figured his system could have handled it:

Some parents NEVER owned their own house, wore Levis, set foot on a golf course, traveled out of the country or had a credit card.

My parents never drove me to school. I had a bicycle that weighed probably 50 pounds, and only had one speed, (slow).

We didn't have a television in our house until I was 10. It was, of course, black and white, and the station went off the air at 11. It came back on the air at about 6 a.m. And there was usually a lo-cally produced news and farm show on, featuring local people ...

I never had a telephone in my room. Our only phone was on a party line. Before you could dial, you had to listen and make sure some people you didn't know weren't already using the line.

Pizzas were not delivered to our home... But milk was & so was bread.

All newspapers were delivered by boys and all boys delivered newspapers --my brother delivered a newspaper, six days a week. He had to get up at 5 AM every morning .

Movie stars kissed with their mouths shut. At least, they did in the movies! There were no movie ratings because all movies were responsibly produced for everyone to enjoy viewing, without profanity or violence or most anything offensive.

If you grew up in a generation before there was fast food, you may want to share some of these memories with your children or grandchildren.

Growing up isn't what it used to be, is it?
