#### The below tribute was submitted to the AU Newsletter by Rich Bernarde

Memorial Day, which was celebrated on Monday, May 29, 2023, is a significant holiday in the United States that honors and remembers the men and women who have served and sacrificed their lives while serving in the country's armed forces. This day serves as a solemn reminder of the profound gratitude and appreciation we owe to those who have made the ultimate sacrifice to protect our freedoms and way of life.

The origins of Memorial Day can be traced back to the aftermath of the American Civil War. As the nation was recovering from the devastating conflict that claimed the lives of over 600,000 soldiers, various communities and cities across the country began to organize tributes and ceremonies to honor the fallen.

One of the earliest recorded observances took place on May 1, 1865, in Charleston, South Carolina, where a group of newly freed African Americans gathered to honor Union soldiers who had died while being held as prisoners of war. They exhumed the bodies from a mass grave and reinterred them in individual graves, decorating each with flowers. This act of remembrance and respect laid the foundation for what would become Memorial Day.

In 1868, General John A. Logan, the national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, issued a proclamation designating May 30 as a day for the purpose of decorating the graves of fallen soldiers with flowers, calling it "Decoration Day." The first national observance of Decoration Day took place at Arlington National Cemetery, where 5,000 participants decorated the graves of both Union and Confederate soldiers.


Over time, Decoration Day evolved into Memorial Day, and its significance expanded to encompass all American military personnel who had died in service to their country. In 1971, Memorial Day was declared a federal holiday to be observed on the last Monday in May, providing a three-day weekend for Americans to reflect on the sacrifices made by those who served.

Memorial Day was commemorated in various ways throughout the nation. It is a time for individuals, families, and communities to came together to honor the fallen by visiting cemeteries, attending memorial services, and participating in parades. The American flag was often flown at half-staff until noon, and at 3:00 p.m. local time, a national moment of remembrance is observed to pause and reflect on the sacrifices made by those who served.

As we celebrated Memorial Day on May 29, 2023, we took a moment to express our deepest gratitude and pay tribute to the men and women who have selflessly served our country. Their courage, dedication, and sacrifice have allowed us to enjoy the freedoms we hold dear. May we always remember and honor their memory.

John j. Alber

John J. Alber, Jr. (Jack), 94, of Wyckoff was born on Christmas Day, Jack was a gift to family and friends for his strength of character, kindness, and sense of humor.

Jack gained a lifelong appreciation for hiking, camping, and swimming through the Boy Scouts, becoming an Eagle Scout and earning Order of the Arrow honors and discovering an enduring love for High Point State Park and the outdoors. He swam competitively in high school and college and continued to swim regularly until last year. Born and raised in Jersey City, Jack earned his BS in Finance from St. Peter's University in Jersey City and worked on Wall Street before joining the US Air Force. Rising to the rank of Captain, Jack flew fighter bombers as part of Strategic Air Command's advanced strike force during the Korean Conflict.

After leaving the Air Force, Jack joined Pan American World Airlines as a pilot, eventually retiring from United Airlines as a Boeing 747 captain. Jack's life as an international commercial airline pilot allowed him many adventures throughout the world, from pre-revolutionary Iran to Moscow and Japan and hundreds of locations in between. He was featured in a May 1986 Wall Street Journal article on fuel efficiency while flying to Japan. But no matter how far he traveled, once he met and married the love of his life in 1957, his happiest days were at home with Pat and their children. Jack and Pat were devoted to each other and our fondest memories of them include their habit of holding hands, whether sitting on the sofa during cocktail hour, watching a movie or taking a walk.

Instead of slowing down in retirement, Jack filled his time with more adventures with his family and friends and out in nature. He enjoyed summers at the lake, winters in Vero Beach, FL, socializing with friends, and traveling, visiting many locations around the world with Pat, their kids, and friends. He was a member of Activities Unlimited (AU), leading their hiking group for many years.

Jack was predeceased by his beloved wife, Patricia, and son, Timothy, parents Margaret and John, and sister Mildred. He is survived by his loving family, including son John (Jack) and wife Paula, daughter Susan and partner Rich Caputo, daughter Christine, and son Michael Edney and wife Janet, as well as his devoted grandchildren Taylor Alber, James Spinella, Breanne Bauer and husband Matt, and Cooper and Colton Burns, as well as many extended family members, and treasured friends.

On April 30, 2023, Robert "Bob" C. Zehm Jr., age 96, passed away peacefully due to natural causes, surrounded by family. Born in Riverside, CA on September 1926, Bob spent most of his life in the Bergen County area of New Jersey. He graduated from Ridgewood HS in 1943 and Stevens Institute of Technology in 1946.

Bob was an Ensign in the Navy for 2 years as a Communications Officer. Bob worked for Prudential Insurance Co in Newark, NJ as a Systems and Methods Analyst for many years. In 1980, he left Prudential to start his own company - Zehm Computer Consultants, Inc. He continued this company until his retirement in 1997. At this time, he became very interested in Artificial Intelligence. He spent the last 20 years of his life working on an AI project he named HIBAM - Human Intelligence By Artificial Means. His hope was to develop an android that would substitute humans in the workforce, freeing them to pursue avocations and other voluntary activities.

Bob enjoyed playing golf and tennis and was a competitive bridge player for many years. At the time of his death, Bob was still an active member of Upper Riverwood Tennis Club, a local discussion club and a billiards group. Living alone, Bob enjoyed dining out and was a regular at many local eateries, his favorite being Savini Restaurant.

Bob leaves behind his children - Robert "Bucky" C. Zehm III and wife, Lisa; Carolyn (Zehm) Kerul and husband, Ed; and stepchildren - Lisa Taylor; Robert "Bobby" Taylor and wife, Debbie; Jaimie Taylor. Bob had 11 grandchildren and 6 great-grandchildren. Bob is also survived by his brother-in-law Robert "Bob" Hoek and family and by nieces Laurel Orr and Nancy Elkus. Bob is preceded in death by his parents, Robert and Alta; his sister Gerry Elkus; his ex-wife Patricia and wife Elizabeth, "Betty".

Bob will be remembered as an intelligent, rational problem-solver who enjoyed sharing his theories and knowledge with others. He will be missed by his family and the many friends he made on his long, life journey.
